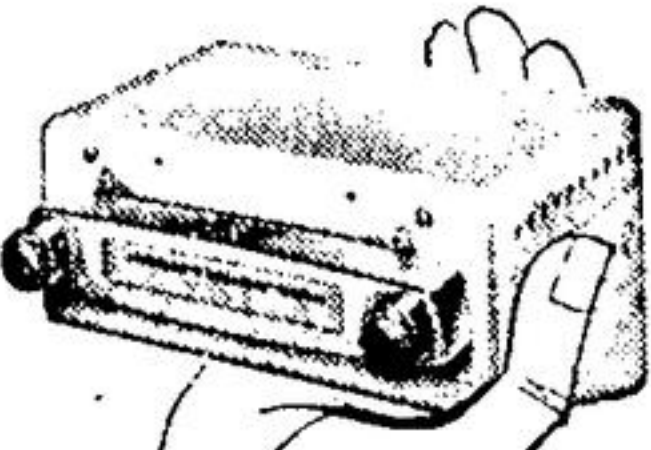

The girls and boys relay team each finished third. Fred Harrison was third in the 100-yard dash, and Barry Jeffery third in pole vault.

High schools entered included Paris, Waterloo/Oxford, Preston, Kitchener, Fergus, Warton, Collingwood, Acton and Georgetown.

Attends Salem Funeral Elderly Aunty was 93

Mrs. Fred McNally attended the funeral of her aunt, Mrs. Allen Saben held Tuesday, May 15th in Salem. Mrs. Saben was the former Emmie Herrington, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Moses Herrington of Smithville, and was in her 94th year. She died on Sunday, May 13.

Mrs. Saben had been enjoying excellent health until she had a fall in her home just a few days before her death, resulting in a broken hip, and pneumonia. She was active in the United Church, and in community affairs all her life.

Born in Smithfield, the late Mrs. Saben lived in Brighton for some years after her marriage in 1885 to Frank Snider, who died in 1901. Upon her remarriage to Mr. Allen Saben in 1905, she moved to Salem and has since made her home there. Mr. Saben predeceased her several years ago.

Mrs. Saben was the last surviving member of the family of ten children of the late Mr. and Mrs. Moses Herrington. Surviving are two daughters and a son, Mrs. Harry Carter (Freda) of Colborne; Mrs. Harry Cockburn (Gladys) of Salem; and one son, Ray Snider, Toronto. There are eight grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

The funeral was largely attended with relatives from Georgetown, Toronto, Oshawa, Gardenville, Morganston, and Gore's Landing.

Mrs. G.A. Robinson Doubly Bereaved

Mrs. G. A. Robinson, 22 Guelph St., suffered a double bereavement last week. She was visiting at the homes of her daughters, Mrs. Edmund Keyes and Mrs. Joseph Kielbasa in Amherst, Mass., when word came of the sudden death of her mother in North Lake, New Brunswick. Mrs. Lockhart had been ill only a few days following a severe stroke. Mrs. Robinson immediately flew down to New Brunswick, but when she arrived at Fredericton a telegram awaited there with the word that her father, Mr. Charles Lockhart, had died the following day, due to the shock of his wife's death.
