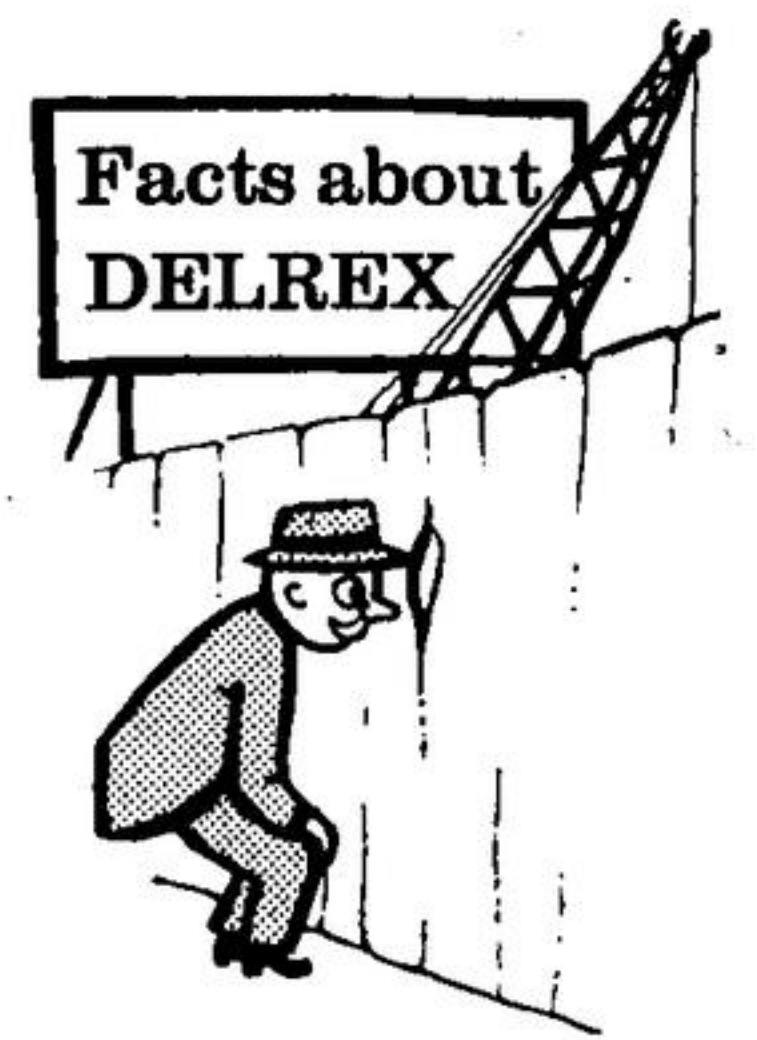
At long last the hum of tractors is heard in the fields as farmers are getting the seeding done. If only the weather will co-operate and dry the land.

Even though full scale construction has not yet begun at Delrex, this new development is already one of Georgetown's major "industries."

Their work ties in closely with that of two engineers, as many as 20 engineering assistants, and a surveyor who works out the many problems concerning services, utilities and land levels.

A sales staff at Delrex handles all home buying details while an outside firm of realtors is responsible for sale of industrial sites.

Serving as a strong "second line" are more than 100 employees of Alrex Contracting Limited, Garnet Building Products and Rex Heshop Homes Ltd. construction workers. These men are responsible for basic production, machine operation and the multitude of important behind-the-scenes operations. As development continues at Delrex, this staff will be almost doubled.

The total working force on Delrex is even greater than outlined for dozens of subcontractors and private builders are involved in the development and each of these companies has its own staff. In all, thousands of man hours will be spent to make Delrex a truly modern city.
