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
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Mrs. John Alexander McAlpine, 81 Dies

Increase Subsidy on Limestone Transport J. E. W.

The Agricultural Limestone Subvention Policy was recently revised and became effective as of May 1st, 1956. Under the revised policy increased financial assistance is now available for movement of limestone both by railway and truck. For transportation by truck, the rate will now be four cents per ton per mile to a maximum of \$1.50 per ton in contrast to the former maximum of \$1.00 per ton. We also note that the price of agricultural limestone loaded on trucks at the quarry from which Halton farmers secure the bulk of

their requirements, is \$1.50 per ton. For those whose soils are below a PH of 6, agricultural limestone is still an economical purchase. Needless to add, the first step before ordering agricultural limestone is to have one's soil tested. Soil sample boxes and instruction sheets re sampling, etc may be secured from the agricultural offices in Milton.

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
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
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
