PAST GRAND MASTER SPEAKS TO LOL 68

At the last meeting of LOL 68, Stewarttown, members and visitors from Hornby and Milton lodges heard Most Worshipful Bro. Several French villages were hosts to 12th of July celebrations for the first time in history. Military warrants were in use again in 1940, many units having Orange Lodges. W. Bro. I. Need Another \$18,000 or Swimming Pool Can't Open

Georgetown's community swimming pool will not open on the scheduled date unless \$18,000 can be raised to complete the \$50,000 building project.

Directors of the swimming pool committee, which is headed by Dick Licata, says it is impossible to finish pool construction without funds pledged to provide payment for the plumbing and electrical work still to be done.

Although public response to a fund campaign has been generous it has not been generous enough. At present some \$32,000 in cash and pledges is available, and this has been all expended on work to date. Another fund canvas is planned, but canvas help is needed, the directors say, and there must first be several volunteers who will work on a canvas, and second, a proper response from the considerable percentage of Georgetown

people who have not donated at all to this community project.

The directors feel badly that those who have given will not, as yet, see the results of their donations, and that children may be deprived of another summer of the benefits of a safe, supervised swimming pool. It would be folly, they feel to open the pool on the chance of collecting the money later, for the task would be doubly hard then, and those who would have to sign notes for the \$18,000 might be left in an awkward position.

Meanwhile, people interested in helping as canvassers are asked to contact financial chairman Don Barranger, Mr. Licata, Secretary Jack Gunning or treasurers Jack Hart or Dick Miller, local bank managers. And those who wish to donate money, can do so easily by leaving their donation or pledge with any of the above.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Proceed With Swanek Roads Still Argue Storm Sewers

In a discussion which occupied over three hours of council's time on Monday, a solution for at least part of the problem of roads and drainage in the Swanek subdivision was found.

Finlay Munro, who sold subdivisions lots for 84 homes to Swanek Brothers, with a promise to provide roads and ditching, agreed at the meeting to proceed immediately with this. He was decisive in his statement that he considered a storm sewer, suggested by the town engineer as the only permanent drainage solution, entirely no affair of his.

Mr. Munro, Wally Swanek of the contracting firm, councillors, several members of Valley Hill Ratepayers Association, and lawyers representing Munro and Swanek took part in the lengthy discussion.

At times it seemed that agreement had been reached, only for the discussions to bog down with new charges and counter-charges.

Reeve Stan Allen led one faction of council which maintained that the storm sewers, if necessary, are an integral part of supplying proper drainage.

Mr. Munro countered all such proposals with statements that he has no contract with the town to do anything in the subdivision and his only obligation is to the Swanek firm. He claimed that completion of the roads has been held up by the town engineer's insistence that storm sewerage, estimated to cost some \$4,000 is needed.

One point of agreement among all parties is that the roads are in almost impassible condition.

The storm sewer question was finally shelved by council for the night after suggestions that (a) the town put them in (by) Swanek and Munro get together and jointly instal them (c) residents pay for them as a local improvement or (d) various combinations of these be tried.

Engineer Douglas Wilson said he would prefer to wait for a heavy rainfall after the roads are gravelled and graded, before passing judgment on their acceptability by the town. He is certain, he said that a portion of the roads will wash out.

"I'll put in the roads. If they wash out it isn't my responsibility" was Mr. Munro's rejoinder to this.

Mr. Munro drew Mayor Armstrong's ire at one stage when he read a letter written to him by the mayor in May, 1953, pointing out the need for more housing and council's interest in seeing the subdivision started.

The mayor said the same situation hardly existed two years later when building finally started, and there had been many changed factors in that time. Other subdivisions had already been proceeded with, agreement to provide water and sanitary sewers granted to the original property owner, the late Tom Hewson, had been withdrawn, and his letter was completely outdated by then, he said.

Mr. Swanek's lawyer explained that his client is suffering the most because NHA money coming to him is being held up pending solution of the road problem. He said he thinks council is using pressure of this withheld money to force either Swanek or Munro to instal a storm sewer, and it is a question who can hold out the longest.

"We think drainage falls in line with roads" said Mayor Armstrong "and it is impossible to put in good roads without good drainage. A subdivider has a responsibility to people buying his houses to assure them that getting into their property is not a problem. We in council want to do the most we can for the majority of ratepayers and roads should be put in so as not to cause future trouble and expense."

Mr. Munro claimed that he had paid \$33,000 for sewers and water mains which had been no part of his original plan, as these were to be put in as local improvements. He said sub-contractor Mansell Nellis had been unable to finish roads because Swanek had left them in a "mess" after preliminary work was done.

The conference ended on an amicable note when Mr. Munro reiterated his decision to have Nellis finish the roads within the next few weeks.
