Insufficient supplies of poliomyelitis vaccine has hampered Halton Health Unit in carrying out as full a program as had been planned this year.

During the three weeks beginning June 4th, it is planned to give second doses to those children who had one dose a month ago. Supplies at present are not sufficient to give a third dose to those children who had two last year.

It is uncertain when an adequate supply of vaccine will be available, but it will probably not be before the end of June. It is felt, however, that children who have had two doses will have adequate protection for this year.
