TRADES TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUNG MEN OF SIXTEEN

Do you want to earn while you learn a trade? Under the Canadian Army Soldier Apprenticeship Plan, starting 1st June, the Canadian Army will accept a limited number of young men for training in 19 different trades.
