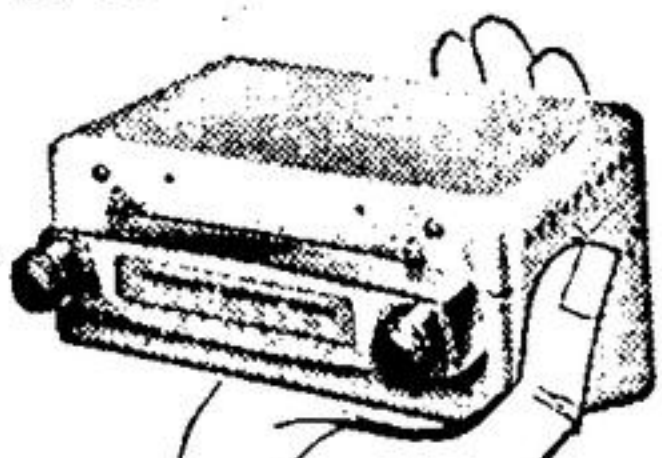

PURCHASE SITE FOR HOSPITAL AT MILTON

The Board of Directors of Milton District hospital, with the approval of the Ont. Dept. of Health have purchased a 10 acre site at the south-east corner of Bronte St. and No. 10 side-road for construction of the new hospital.

Originally part of the Andrew Woodley farm, the 10 acre corner location was picked over at least six other sites, on the basis of extensive engineering reports on availability, view, ease of servicing and type of site.

Purchase price of the 10 acre parcel was \$1,000 per acre although the balance of the farm was sold at \$1300. Board members praised Mr. and Mrs. Woodley's attitude on extending a lower price to them.

The site will have 650 feet frontage on both Bronte Street and No. 10 side-road. Board members also reported they had been assured of adequate zoning to protect the hospital area from construction of any neighbouring unsuitable buildings.

The engineering report on the site indicated "air ideal, directly off mountain." Further points of the report were the psychology of the view is good as the site sees both mountains and overlooks the lowlands to the east and west. Noise is limited to Bronte St. and one or two trains of a light nature per day. Access to building is ideal due to corner location off good access road. Type of site is good due to natural slope in two directions with high portion away from both roads. Water and sewage readily accessible.

A further engineering report was made on the installation of sewers and it was determined adequate fall for connection to the nearest line was available.

The decision of the Board to purchase the site was an almost unanimous one and members are planning ahead to the engaging of architects as the next step toward construction of the new hospital.
