Sewer Accident Victim Still on Critical List

Albert Rose, 30, seriously injured in an accident while working for Armo Drainage in a tunnel excavation under the CNR embankment near John Street is still unconscious, although showing some signs of improvement.

He was injured on May 8th, when a hydraulic jack broke in the tunnel, inflicting severe head injuries. He underwent brain surgery a few days later in Toronto General Hospital, where he is still a patient. He is paralyzed on one side.

The accident took place during a tricky tunnelling operation which will link a sanitary sewer line from the new Swanek subdivision to the town's sewer system.
