CHAMBER OF COMMERCE**

Coincident with the announcement of a 10,000 acre residential and industrial construction this year comes the formation of The Streetsville and District Chamber of Commerce. The organization at this branch of the chamber at its commerce was submitted May 10th. At the first regular meeting on that date it was announced that an initial membership of 30 has been attained. Firms represented in members include manufacturing, distributing and all types of merchandising organizations in the area. It was reported that the total of members will soon be doubled within the next few months.

Officers elected on the recommendation of the nominating committee were: Honorary Chairman: Mr. Frank Farnham; Vice-president, F. M. McLean; secretary, Mrs. Reg Broadhead; treasurer, Jack Wright; Bill McLaughlin, Howard Ross, A. S. McLean and Harry Jones, directors.

Mr. Ben W. Astor explained that the chamber of commerce had invited Mr. Marion of Brampton Bed, Ltd. as the first president because of Mr. Marion's extensive financial and managerial experience, his extensive local business connections and his extensive experience in the Chamber of Commerce type. He added the new chamber through its first year of operation.

A year ago, Mr. Marion came to Ashgrove as executive vice-president and general manager of Brampton Bed Limited. Prior to that he was executive assistant to the president of Canada Health and Welfare Assurance Corporation in Hull. He was senior management consultant with Associated Management Consultants. In the past he served in positions of president, general manager, corporate treasurer and comptroller of an organization which participated in management of multiple companies.

A member of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and the Board of Trade Mr. Marion assisted in forming the young men's section of the Montreal Board of Trade and thus includes a committee which made an economic study of northwestern Quebec, the report of which later sold at \$10.00 per copy. Mr. Marion is a former vice-president of the Canadian Credit Institute.

"Mr. Marion's education included studies at McGill University, University of Toronto, The London School of Economics and the University of London, where he wrote his thesis on Economics. He holds the degrees of CGA and MCI.

"During the World War II he served overseas in Armored Reconnaissance with the 17th Duke of York Royal Canadian Hussars."

**Orenda to Begin Lay-off
Plans Cutback in
Production at Malton**

Orenda Engines Ltd. of Malton is to start laying off employees and cutting back production.

Walter R. McLachlan, vice president and general manager, in a statement to the company's 5,000 employees, said the layoff would extend gradually over a two month period starting in the next week or two. About 350 workers will be affected.

To date, more than 3,000 Orenda engines have been produced for the twin engine CF-100 and the single-engine F86 Sabre, the RCAF's two front line fighters. Orders have also been filled for the South African and Colombian governments.

A spokesman for the Defense Production Dept. in Ottawa said production of the jet engine reached a peak of 100 a month during the Korean war. Since hostilities ceased, production has been cut to about 50 per month and is to be cut still further on a sliding scale for about the next year.

The current layoffs will affect both production and service workers in some departments of the plant.

The company statement added, however, that the size of the labour had been reduced by increased activities in the Orenda engineering and experimental plant, where work is proceeding on a large turbojet designed for supersonic flight.

The new engine is being designed for the CF-105, a supersonic fighter plane being developed for the RCAF.

The addition of a third unit in the experimental plant absorbed many employees who otherwise might have been affected by the cut in the current schedule of engine deliveries.


