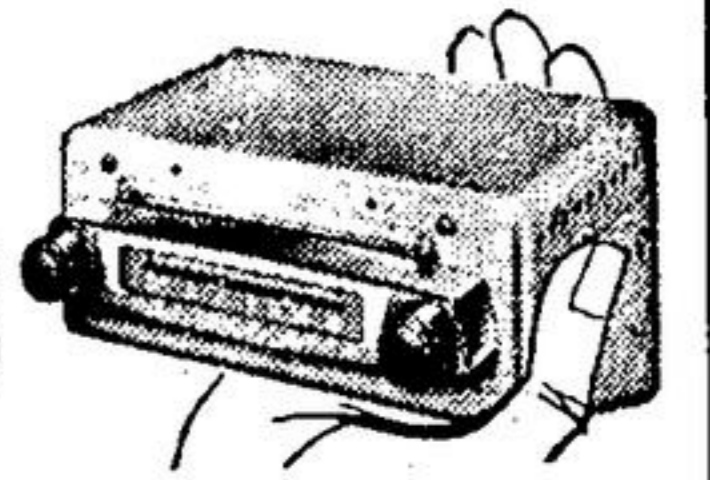

Pendulum Gift Shows Earth's Rotation



Visible proof of the earth's rotation is shown by a Foucault pendulum presented to the United Nations Headquarters recently by the Netherlands Government. It consists of 280-pound gold-plated sphere suspended by 57-foot stainless steel wire from ceiling of entrance lobby in General Assembly Hall. As earth rotates, sphere swings back and forth over a magnet, the plane of swing shifting slowly clockwise so that complete cycle is made every 36 hours and 45 minutes. Foucault is named after French physicist Jean Bernard Foucault who used the pendulum in 1851 in Pantheon at Paris to demonstrate that the earth revolves on its axis.
