**CORONARY THROMBOSIS**

Until about 1900, death rates in middle age were high for both men and women. Death rates today in this age group are 90% higher for men than women. The diseases involved are coronary thrombosis and cancer of the bronchus as major causes of death, and duodenal ulcer as a cause of chronic sickness. It should now be realized that there is an epidemic of these conditions as lethal to middle-aged females as were tuberculosis or smallpox in the past.

The effect of exercise in regard to coronary thrombosis is of absorbing interest. It has been shown that men doing heavy work have half the rate of coronary disease of those doing light work.
