

PUBLIC HEARING For the Credit River Drainage Area



The Ontario Water Resources Commission will hold a public hearing in the Courthouse, Town of Brampton, on TUESDAY, JULY 10th, 1956

COMMENCING AT 9.30 A.M.

This will be an Open Hearing, called to consider problems of Water Need, Water Supply and Water Pollution in the Credit River Drainage Area.

All interested parties are invited to attend and present their views in writing, preferably in eight copies. Please advise the Secretary in advance of your intention to put in a Submission. As much detail as possible is required of present water availability, its seasonal variation and quality together with figures of present and future water demand for domestic, industrial and irrigation purposes.

If you have a problem of water supply or water pollution then this is your opportunity to make it known and to put your proposals before this Commission.
