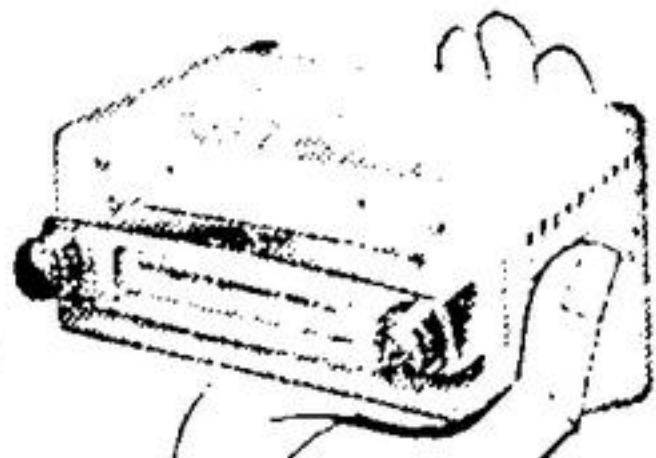

### WHAT COUNCIL DID

## ENGINEER SUGGESTS SEEK FURTHER SOURCE OF WATER

Present water consumption in town is well over a million gallons daily, and capacity of the water system is two and a half million gallons," town engineer Douglas Wilson told council at their meeting last week.

Mr. Wilson, reminding council that if one large industry locates here, it could use enough water to tax facilities to capacity, said he would recommend that exploratory work be undertaken to locate potential wells and buy property where they are found.

The town would then be in a position to move fast if and when required, he said.

Council asked the water committee, headed by Reeve Stan Allen, to investigate what firms are in the "water-locating" business and make a future recommendation to council.

Reeve Allen reported that the new water system is in operation with a diesel motor, but his committee is anxious to complete electrical work and put the permanent electrical motors to work.

"Will we have the highway surface finished in August?" was Mayor Armstrong's query. He received an affirmative reply from the engineer.

Reeve Allen asked if there is a

guarantee on paving work done on Queen Street a few years ago, and said that with present deterioration it will be in bad shape again soon. The company which did the paving will be contacted to see if they will patch broken spots.

Initial readings were given for borrowing by-laws for a \$4500 water main on Albert Street and a \$6,000 main on Kennedy Street. Both will be six inch mains.

Cr. LeRoy Dale asked about moving the hydro pole on the Highway-Water Street corner and was told this is being considered as part of the highway widening program.

The pole, unfortunately, is a key one, said the mayor, carrying rural, local and Ontario hydro lines. It will cost at least \$1500 to relocate it, he believes.

## PUBLIC HEARING

For the Credit River Drainage Area



The Ontario Water Resources Commission will hold a public hearing in the Courthouse, Town of Brampton, on **TUESDAY, JULY 10th, 1956**  
COMMENCING AT 9.30 A.M.

This will be an Open Hearing, called to consider problems of Water Need, Water Supply and Water Pollution in the Credit River Drainage Area.

All interested parties are invited to attend and present their views in writing, preferably in eight copies. Please advise the Secretary in advance of your intention to put in a submission. As much detail as possible is required of present water availability, its seasonal variation and quality together with figures of present and future water demand for domestic, industrial and irrigation purposes.

If you have a problem of water supply or water pollution then this is your opportunity to make it known and to put your proposals before this Commission.

The constructive participation of Municipal bodies, Industries, Organizations and all interested individuals is requested.
