TV GRAPHIC TELECAST VISITS THE REX HESLOPS  
Georgetown was publicized on the national TV network Friday when Graphic telecast viewers on a tour of Rex Heslop's home, while Joe McCulley interviewed Mr. Heslop.

Described as a "construction millionaire who builds whole cities" Mr. Heslop was first pictured sitting in the living room of his home and answered questions about his career from the time he built his first house in 1943 to his latest 2000 acre Delrex project.

Joined by Mrs. Heslop, he then proceeded to the downstairs recreation room where viewers had a glimpse of the Junior soda bar, daughter Marilyn's doll collection, and the swimming pool where Mar-

ilyn, Gail McGillivray, and Gail Thompson were enjoying a swim. Son Rex, Jr., was also introduced. People also were shown the terrace overlooking the valley, and the scale model of Delrex which has been on view at various home shows and the trade fair.

## Planning Board Reviews Zone By-Law with Faludi

A zoning by-law for Georgetown moved one step closer Thursday when Dr. E. G. Faludi, whose draft by-law has been under review by the planning board for several weeks, discussed it with the board. Chairman Edwin Wilson presided at the meeting in the council chamber with all members present, Bob McMenemy, Claude Kentner, Harold Bairstow, Mayor Jack Armstrong, Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent, Cr. Irwin Noble and secretary Clarence Benham.

Several points which the board wished clarified, or where revisions will be made were discussed with Dr. Faludi. When revisions are made on the by-law accepted by the board, it is planned to present it to the town council, who, after further possible revisions, will call a public meeting at which ratepayers may air their views. Zoning will become law at some later date after the by-law is as perfect as possible.

## Bill Bingham Gets Try-Out With Ticats

Bill Bingham, of Smith & Stone drafting dept. and former grid star with McMaster University has been signed for a tryout with the Hamilton Tiger Cats of the Big Four.

Bill, who stands 6'4", and plays right end was being scouted by several football clubs but Jake Gaudaur, Ticat general manager, got there first with a contract.

A Terra Cotta resident, he is the first footballer from the Georgetown area to seem headed for a professional gridiron career since Bill Thompson, Jr. of Geesee St. was only prevented from starting the '55 season with the Edmonton Eskimos by a last minute leg injury.

## At present the town has two requests for commercial buildings between Fairview Inn and the IGA Store, where there are also some residences.

Mayor Armstrong wanted to know what answer should be given Fred Ross, who now has a barber shop in his house and wants to create two or three stores on the property.

It is important in view of the fact that someday all properties in the area may be commercial, the mayor said, to have a free area at the rear of such stores for a future service road.

Dr. Faludi said it would be in order to have a builder reserve such an area, but he does not think it legal to have him deed this to the town for a road when such a road cannot be built. Perhaps the solution will be to create a new "highway commercial zone" in the by-law, he thought, and he promised to give the matter further study and send a revision to a meeting this week.

Revisions will also be made in industrial zoning which now prohibits certain specified industries such as tanneries and waste product converters from locating in any industrial area. The board suggested that in the M3 area, bordering the railway line in Delrex, that there might be more leeway especially since many industries formerly classes as obnoxious are now acceptable in the light of manufacturing refinements.

The board is planning a tour of town to study location of R1, R2 and R3 areas, residential divisions graded according to desirability of location. The great percentage of present residential sections are designated R2.

Dr. Faludi strongly recommends that church building be banned from all three groups, with the exceptions of areas already allotted in Delrex. Churches, he said, have parking problems and can create inconvenience in the present settled parts of town, and should locate where there is plenty of parking space.

There were questions also by the board about a house located in an industrial area which might be partially destroyed by fire.

An owner, receiving a portion of insurance could be in the unhappy position of not being able to rebuild his house, and yet one lot might not be saleable for industry.

"There can be exceptions where circumstances warrant," said Dr. Faludi, explaining that there must be some specific regulations in a by-law and a council always is sympathetic to an individual problem when it occurs.

Dr. Faludi was asked why he suggests a certificate to be issued when a building is completed, when the original building permit would cover the same ground.

"That is to stop cheap builders who don't buy according to the by-law," he replied, saying that a permit may be taken for a single family dwelling only to find that it had become semi-commercial by adding a hairdressing salon or something similar.

"We wouldn't want to stop the person who builds as he can afford and takes perhaps five years to finish his house," said the mayor, citing several instances of such homes which are a credit to the town in their finished state.

"Don't forget that such a house has a low assessment in its intermediate stages," said Dr. Faludi "and is subsidized by the rest of the town until it is finished."

Here again, however, he said, there must be a law and it can be subject to the judgment of the town council when it should be enforced rigidly and when exceptions can be made.

It was suggested that rather than charge an extra fee for an inspection permit, that the clause be incorporated in the building by-law.
