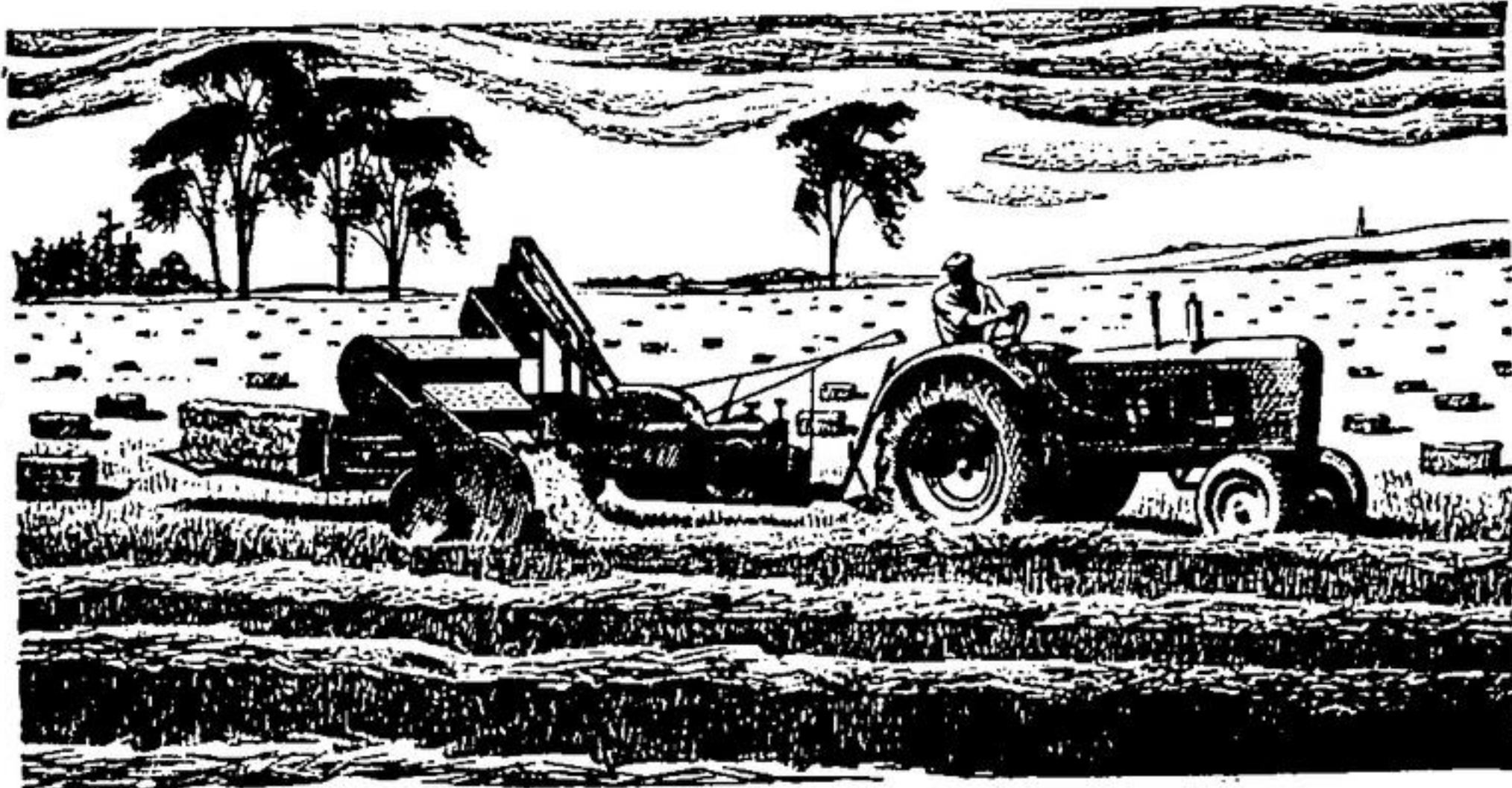

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Storm Sewers the Answer . . . But Who's to Pay?

Ratepayers in the Swanek subdivision and council members are agreed on one thing — storm sewers are the only solution to overcome poor drainage and they should be put in without cost to the town.

Sam Reid, president of Valley Hill Ratepayers association, discussed the involved matter again, when he appeared for the group at last week's council meeting. The meeting was two days after a heavy storm which flooded cellars in several subdivisions houses.

Jim McBride, who accompanied Mr. Reid to the meeting, said there was no use going over the same ground again. Road commissioner Walter Gray (who was absent from the meeting through illness) had looked over the subdivision that afternoon and expressed concern over the way roads are being graded, Mr. McBride said.

Mayor Armstrong said he has no exact answer for a final solving of drainage difficulties, but it is to be hoped that subdivider Finlay Munro and contractor Swanek Bros. will be sharing the costs when it is built.

"There is a great inconvenience in waiting," said the mayor, "but if the Cloverdale subdivision is a criterion, waiting is an advantage to everyone. The only thing I can see in the meantime is for our engineer to push the contractor as much as possible."

The mayor said he is banking on a statement by Swanek lawyer Mr. Lyons, made at the council - Swanek - Munro conference recently, that final NHA payment is not forthcoming until the town accepts the roads.

"Mr. Swanek made a good impression on me, but he's an old

builder and should know what kind of a road is needed," said Cr. LeRoy Dale. "Swanek and Munro seem to be blaming each other and the sooner there is a showdown the better. If NHA were given all the story it might lead to action."

Mr. Reid said he had been told by the NHA district office that they could not hold back final payments to the contractor, pending settlement of the road dispute. The town clerk John D. Kelly said that a letter sent to the town from NHA confirmed this.

"Then I'd go whole hog and go through our local MP right to C. D. Howe," said Mr. Dale.

Cr. McGilvray said he understood home owners are being asked to "sign off" and suggested that a meeting between owners and Swanek and Munro might produce some results.

Another resident, R. Brighty, opined that joint action of council and ratepayers is necessary.

"The lower end of Hewson Crescent is built up two feet higher than the lawns," said Cr. Alfred Sykes. "How can it possibly be drained?"

Mr. Reid said there wasn't much road to wash out in the storm because there hadn't been much work done on them. There had been no gravel put on the roads since last fall, he said.

Engineer Douglas Wilson said he understood that Mr. Nellis, who will be doing the grading, would be finishing work in Sunbeam Heights the next day, and planned to go into the Swanek area the next day.

Council decided to have solicitor George Hewson go into the whole matter in detail, to see what solution can be given to Georgetown's thorniest problem. Both Mr. Hewson and the town clerk will then write to the NHA regional office in Etobicoke, copies of their letters going to Ottawa through local MP Sybil Bennett, Q.C.
