**Demonstration of  
Mechanical Grazing**

Over the past year or two much has been written on the subject of mechanical grazing or zero pasturing. It is a practice which was initiated some years ago in the United States and is now being practiced to a limited extent in Ontario. Thanks to the initiative of Gordon King, president of the Halton and Peel Guernsey Club, and John McDougall, manager of Lazy Pat Farm at Palermo, Halton farmers had an opportunity of seeing a practical demonstration at Lazy Pat Farms on Thursday evening of last week.

Despite the busy season, some 75 Haltonites availed themselves of the opportunity. It was an excellent programme and aside from the mechanical grazing feature, there were many new ideas to be seen here and there about this progressive farmstead. The milking herd of forty Guernsey cows apparently enjoy having their grass and clover brought to them. At the present they are consuming approximately four tons of green feed daily. A new style piggery was inspected — here the market hogs receive free choice of shelled corn and concentrate. According to Mr. McDougall, on this type of feeding the average market hog consumes 50 lbs. of starter; 80 lbs. of concentrate; and 500 lbs. of shelled corn. A number of Halton hog producers are reported to be following this method of feeding with excellent results.

Following the various tours, competitions were held in judging of Yorkshire Gilts and Guernsey heifers. On the Swine class where Donald McNabb of the Livestock Marketing Service of the Canada Dept. of Agriculture was the official judge, the prize winners were Allan Patterson and George Greenlees, J. Lloyd Chisholm, well known Guernsey breeder, officiated on the Guernsey side and here the top awards were won by Marvin Curtis and Ralph Ford.

Refreshments served by the staff of Lazy Pat Farms brought to conclusion one of the most interesting twilight meetings it has been our privilege to attend in some little time.

**LIME CAN BE  
APPLIED ANY TIME**

The question is often asked — "when is the best time to apply lime?" The field crops branch of the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture advises that lime can be used any time of the year. It may be spread on the snow, it may be used in the spring, the summer or the fall, on sod, pasture, stubble, on land being seeded or on summer fallow. Right now, before the rush of other work becomes too great, would be a very good time to apply lime to soil requiring it.

Observation of growing crops at this season of the year helps in determining whether soil really needs lime. Where yellow or reddish sheep sorrel appears on sod fields in June an acid soil is indicated. Poor catches and stands of alfalfa appears on sod fields in June, an acid soil is indicated. Poor catches and stands of alfalfa and clover may result from lack of lime, but on cold, wet soil, liming will not take the place of improved drainage. Further particulars may be had from the booklet "Does Your Soil Need Lime?" which may be obtained from agricultural representatives in every county and district. This publica-
