Nine-year-old Guillermo Ardon finds it fun to begin his day with a wash and brush up. He is one of thousands of school children for whom a toothbrush, towel, soap and comb are shaping a change as a result of the health education program launched by the Government of Honduras with \$40,000 worth of UNICEF assistance and additional sums supplied by the Inter-American Cooperative Services for Agriculture, Education and Public Health. The Government, which itself plans to spend \$27,500 a year on the program, opened its first demonstration project at a sunny, well-equipped school at Danli, some 50 miles from Tegucigalpa, capital of Honduras. When in full swing, nutrition and hygiene will form part of the normal daily curriculum in 100 schools throughout the country.

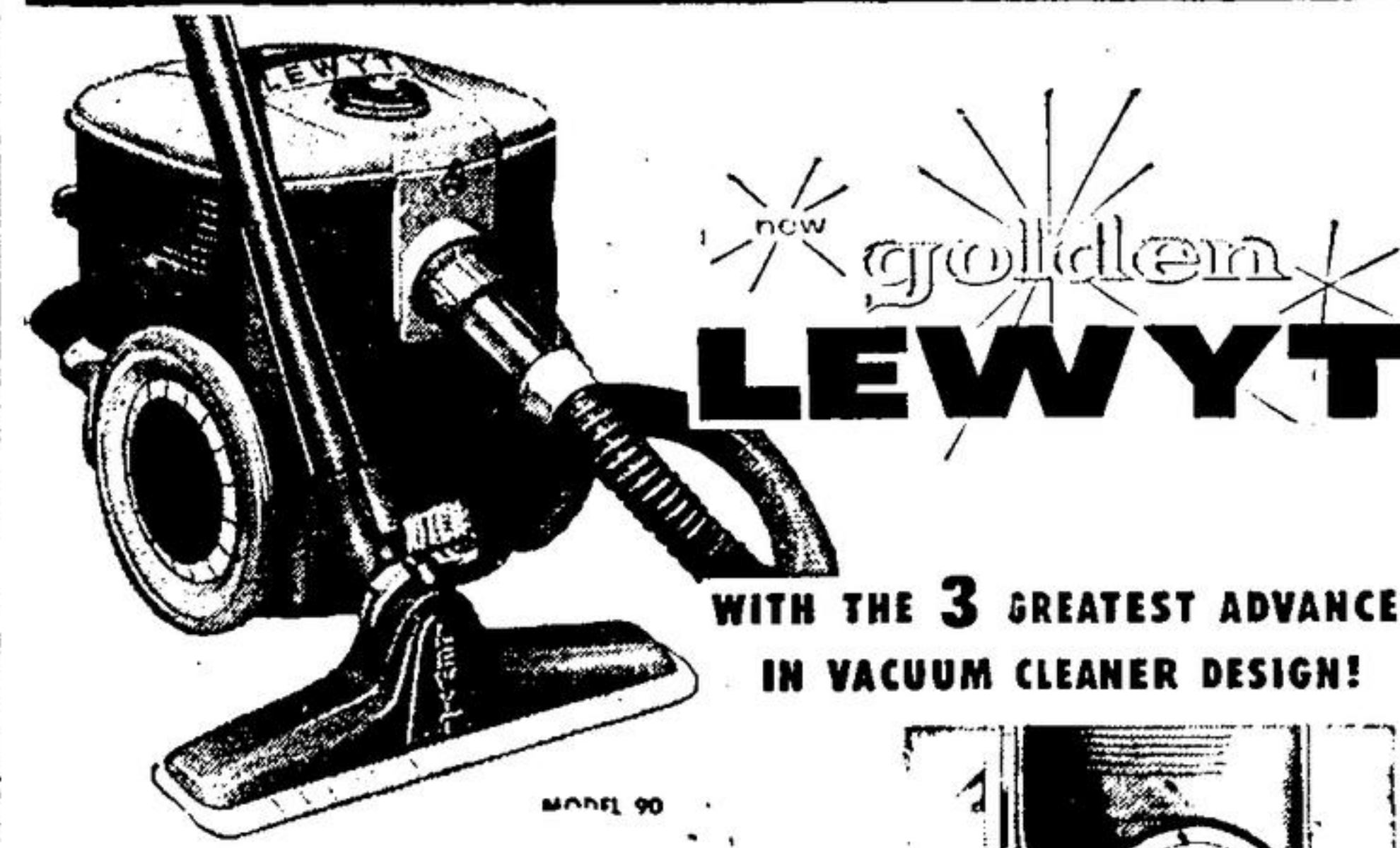

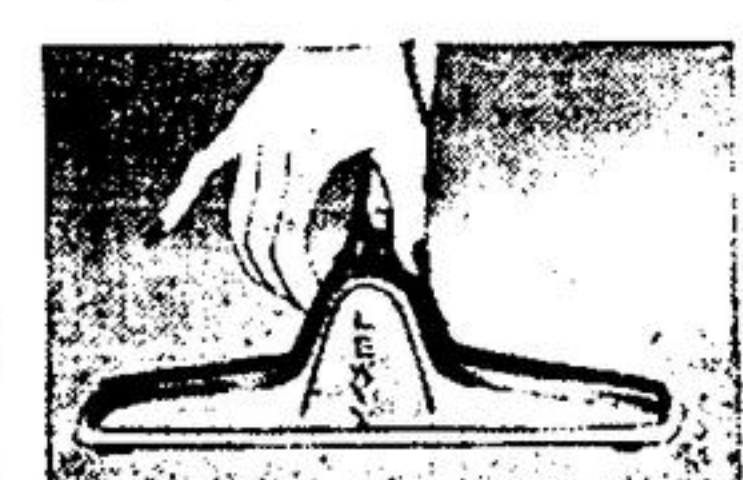

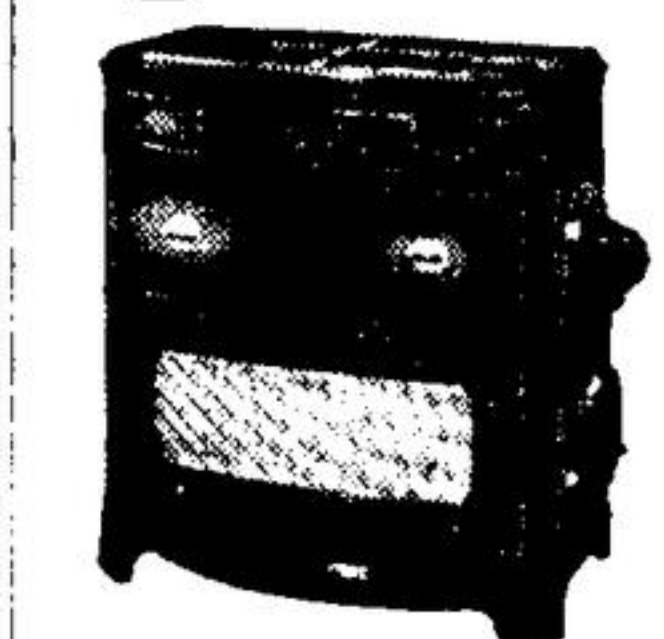
