## Arthritis

(A Continued Article)

How many kinds of arthritis are there?

There are two main types, osteo and rheumatoid arthritis, plus other lesser known varieties.

The most common is osteo arthritis. More millions of people suffer from this than any other classification.

The joints in the body have many parts and membranes, cartilage, oil sacs, bones, etc. Osteo arthritis affects mainly the bone section and so derives its name "osteo" meaning bone. Osteo arthritis is known as the "wear and tear" disease. Over-activity in work or exercise can cause wearing out of the cushion of cartilage at the end of the bone. It is also called degenerative or hypertrophic arthritis.

But there is more to it than just a wearing out of bones. For every million persons who have this "wear and tear" arthritis, there are twenty million people of the same age, doing the same type of work, who do not have the disease.

The cause of the condition used to be shrugged off as part of the "aging process" but in 1949 Dr. E. F. Rosenburg of Chicago stated that it was time to refute the belief that osteo arthritis came from ageing.

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### WHAT COUNCIL DID

#### Low Bond Market Cancels Sidewalks

A long-range sidewalk replacement program will be continued this year in Georgetown.

At a council meeting last Wednesday, road chairman Walter Gray presented a list of locations where broken pavement will be replaced. The list, he said, names what he and town engineer Douglas Wilson decided were the most necessary after a survey of the

whole town.

A total of 2500 feet of replacement is planned, with estimated cost about \$6,000.

Streets to be revitalized include Main Street from Guelph to James; Albert Street from McNab to Guelph; Draper St., from James to George; Young St., from Market to Edith; Durham St., from McNab to Guelph, and Market Street from Mill to William.

Reeve Stan Allen objected strongly to damage caused by contractors who, while moving heavy equipment on to private property, break sidewalks. There should be a fine, he said, for not taking proper precautions to protect the sidewalks.

Mayor Armstrong said that in 1948, it was suggested in council that trucks carry two planks for such use, but that at that time the motion had not found favour when it was put to a vote.

### RURAL MINISTERS GO TO SCHOOL AT OAC

Rural ministers of all denominations are meeting at the Ont. Agricultural College, Guelph from July 23 to 27, at the annual school for rural clergymen, when they will go back to school to learn something of the problems of their farm people, and the latest developments in agriculture.

Three main courses are provided. The course in rural sociology will relate social science to the understanding of country people and their problems. Those who take the Soils and Land Use course will study such subjects as soil conservation, reforestation, special types of farming for special conditions, and the effect of urban encroachment on farm land. The nutrition course includes a study of the nutritional value of foods that Canadians eat, and the relationship of food to human welfare.

Also included in the course are field trips to see important agricultural developments, the judging of livestock, and practical work in the use of visual fields.

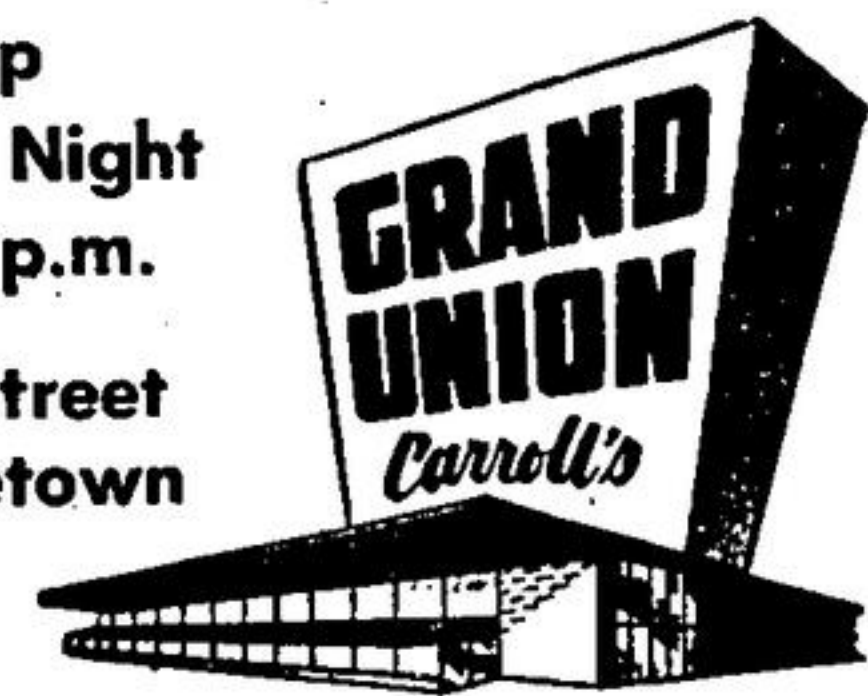
A program including Home Economics and Horticulture is being planned for the wives of the ministers who attend.

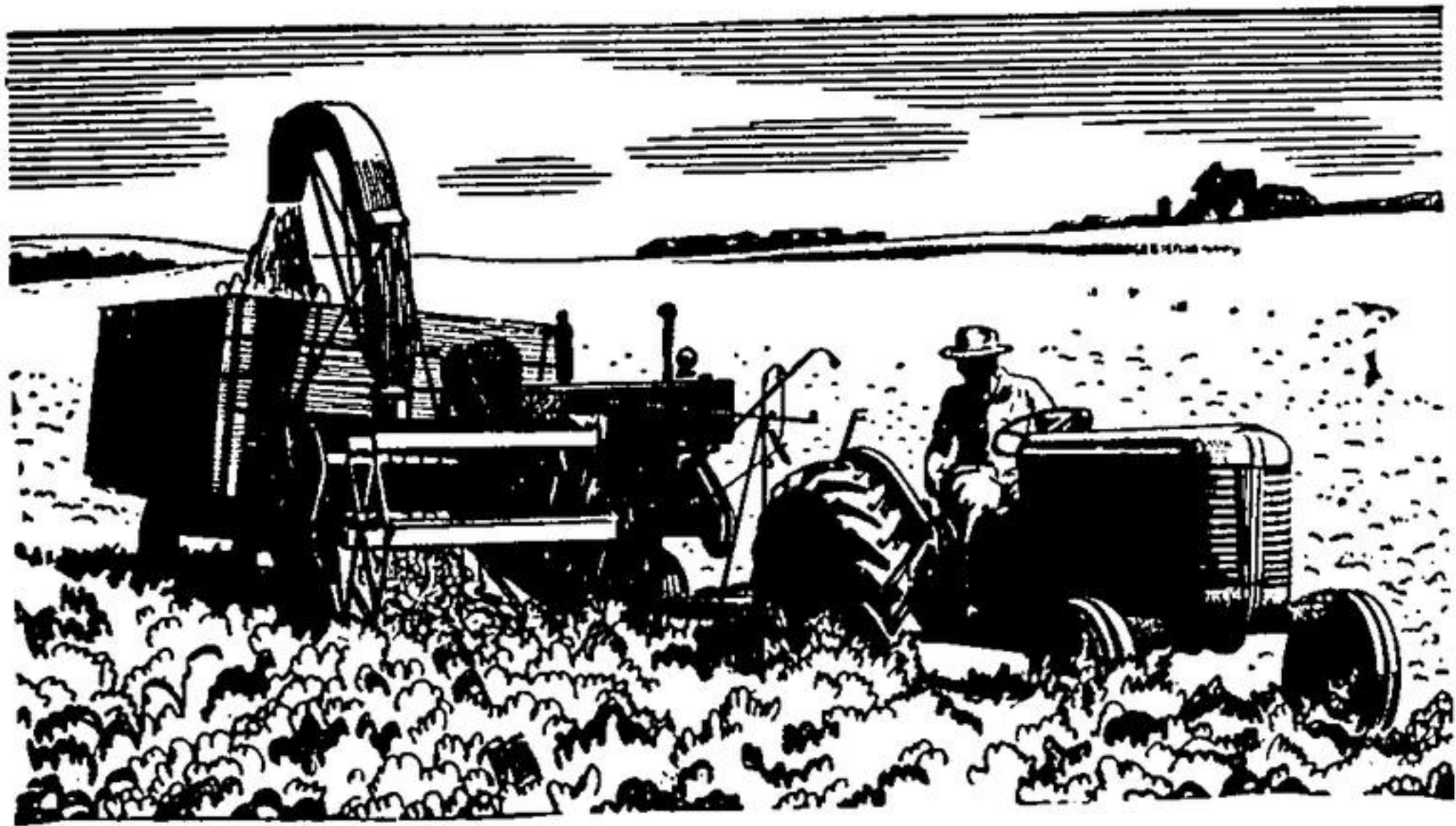
