4-H MEMBERS HAVE VERY BUSY WEEK

 This week has been a busy one for 4-H members, with the following meetings held. On Monday evening all members of the Halton 4-H Potato Club met at the Dept. of Agriculture board room. This club has an enviable record of attendance this season, having now held four meetings, with perfect attendance at each meeting. On Tuesday evening the Halton 4-H Guernsey-Jersey and the Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club held a joint meeting at the farm of Finlay Joyce, R. R. No. 5, Milton, and on Thursday evening, members of the Beef and Dual Purpose 4-H Calf Club met for their monthly meeting at Malden Farm owned by Dr. James and managed by Jim McKay. Here it was announced that the annual 4-H bus trip for Halton 4-H

agricultural clubs is scheduled for Tuesday, August 7th, and will include a visit to the Provincial Parliament Buildings, a swim and picnic at Sunnyside, a tour of one of the Toronto daily newspapers, and an international league baseball game between Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Royals. For the past four or five years, Halton and Peel counties have combined for their 4-H bus trip. Separate trips are arranged this year, in fact some one hundred Peel 4-H members participated in theirs on Wednesday of last week, visiting the Koffman furniture plant; Georgian china factory and grain elevators at Collingwood, swam at Wasaga and called at the farm of George Faris near Bond Head. —Your visits and visitors are the Herald's biggest news. FARM NEWS

Haying Operations Long Drawn Out

 Haying has now been in progress for at least one and one-half months. It is exasperating to put it mildly, and perhaps the only consolation is that the total yield has been much higher than most anticipated. Aftermath from the early cut hay has made remarkable growth with stands reported up to twenty inches in height at time of writing. We were interested in an observation made by Ward Brownridge of Esqueping Township, when he showed us some second crop brome grass 18 inches high from a field which had its 1st crop cut June 19th. Timothy on the same field is about 2 inches high he Ward. From this observation we can readily conclude why OTC seed mixture recommendations include in the main, such grasses as Brome and Orchard. We would point out further, that according to Circular No. 239, the latest on Hay and Pasture Mixtures for Ontario published by OAC . . . Brome has a wider adaptation than Timothy and Orchard Grass, and almost as wide an adaptation for drainage and climatic condition. With considerable hay yet to be handled there is an overlapping of operations as the binding of wheat is general as we write this on July 27th. We recall that at the time of the 4-H bus trip the second week of July a year ago, considerable wheat was threshed and combining was in progress. It is to be hoped that settled weather will prevail soon so that the wheat harvest will not be as time consuming as haying, and that the moisture content will be low enough for good storage or delivery to the mills.
