High masonic officials from several communities joined local friends to pay last respects to Edward V. (Ted) MacCormack, Ph.M.B. at the funeral service Friday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Mr. MacCormack, who was 49, was one of the district's most prominent members of the Masonic order.
He succumbed to a heart attack in Toronto General Hospital Tuesday morning. He had entered hospital a few days before and his unexpected death occurred the day before he was to have undergone a minor operation.
Mr. MacCormack had been a Main Street druggist since 1934, when he purchased the business of the late Lorne Dann. A native of Point Edward, he spent his boyhood in Sault Ste. Marie and after graduating from Ontario College of Pharmacy, in Toronto, he worked in drug stores in Belleville and the Soo before entering business for himself in Georgetown.
He was extremely well-known here, for in addition to his business activities, there was scarcely a phase of community life where he had not served in some capacity.
A member of Credit Lodge, AF & AM, he was lodge master in 1943, and in 1946-47 served as district deputy grand master. He was principal of Halton Chapter RAM in 1941, and in 1949-50 was district grand superintendent. He was a Shriner, member of the Scottish Rite, and of Guelph Preceptory of the York Rite.
Mr. MacCormack had also been a noble grand of Orion IOOF lodge, and was a past district deputy grand master.
He had served for several terms as a public school trustee in the early '40's, was prominent on Victory Loan committees during the war, and was president of Georgetown Recreation Commission when that organization came into existence in 1946.
He had served in executive positions with town and county Progressive-Conservative organizations and was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Georgetown. At the time of his death he was a member of Georgetown Cemetery Board, North Halton Golf and Country Club and St. John's United Church.
He continued an early interest in sports and was a particularly ardent fan of local hockey teams. In college he managed a pharmacy team which won the U of T championship, with several players who later went on to professional hockey careers.
Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William John MacCormack, he inherited dramatic ability from his parents, both of whom were professional entertainers. At one time he considered a stage career, and after entering business he occasionally took part in local amateur plays, while also developing his ability as an after-dinner speaker and master of ceremonies at lodge gatherings and garden parties.
Surviving are his wife, Mabel Evans; one son Bill who is entering his third year course in pharmacy at the U of T; and brothers and sisters, Lorne and Mrs. F. Rogers, Sault Ste. Marie, Ray of Jacksonville, Florida, Mrs. Lola O'Boyle, Detroit, Michigan, and Mrs. C. Milner, Sarnia.
Rev. Morgan McFarlane conducted the funeral service at the funeral home, and a Masonic service was conducted in Greenwood Cemetery by the lodge chaplain, Rev. G. Lockhart Royal, worshipful master James F. Evans and Grand Lodge officials. Pallbearers were Leslie Clark, Denney Charles, Jack Lucas, Frank Wilson, Walter Fidler and Mayor Jack Armstrong.
