

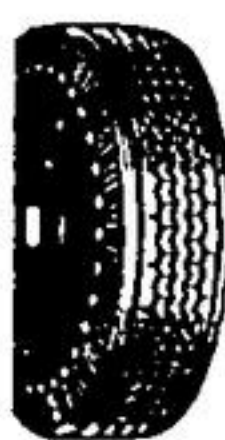

WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Choose 6 Applicants
For Police Interview**

Six applicants for the position of probationary police constable will be interviewed next Monday, it was decided at a council meeting last night.

Applications from a total of 14 men were read at the meeting and the six chosen from these for interview.

The vacancy was created by resignation of Clifford Found, who is working at the new Fina station. A previous vacancy, when Forrester resigned to become Palmerston's police chief, was filled last week when Ted Scott, a Toronto man with experience on the Forest Hill force was hired.

Council okayed a survey of property in the Main Street North district where a storm sewer is planned to take care of a bad drainage condition.

Solicitors Hewson & Ord reported that all but one property owner have agreed to allow the necessary easements for the sewer across their properties, to drain the land down George Street into a creek.

A sanitary sewer extension will be made on Elm Street to serve the new Smith and Stone plant and a number of other properties. Only one tender was received in response to advertisements, and a \$2400 contract for the job was awarded to Hamilton Excavating, Guelph.

No action was taken on a proposed roadway which Harry Verhey has offered to dedicate to the town in order to open up land north of Mountainview Road where two houses have been constructed and others could be built.

Mr. Verhey has offered a 50 foot roadway, and council hesitates to accept this in place of the standard 66 feet called for.

Opinion was divided on whether the town should accept the land, or whether Mr. Verhey should construct it himself, then deed it to the town.

Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent's planning committee will study the matter further.

INTEREST IN 4-H GARDEN CLUBS INCREASING

Garden clubs continue to grow in popularity in the 4-H program in Canada, in fact, since 1945 the number of clubs has increased from 171 to 869. The objectives of garden clubs, aside from the citizenship training aspects common in all 4-H clubs, are to demonstrate the use of approved gardening and storage practices and to encourage the consumption of a greater variety of vegetables in the farm home throughout the year.

In most areas, garden clubs are organized under a three to four year program. In Manitoba, however, a fifth and sixth year program has been added. In each case the regular club requirements are the same, namely the planting and caring for the garden plot, submitting monthly report forms, written tests, and exhibiting a display of vegetables at the club's achievement day.

In addition to these regular requirements, fifth and sixth year garden club members in Manitoba render assistance to local leaders in helping younger members with their project work and are required to prepare weed and insect collections, which in turn are exhibited at achievement day.

According to F. J. Weir, provincial horticulturist, this added feature of the garden club program in Manitoba is proving popular with the 4-H members and is helping, not only to broaden educational value of the project but also to retain the interest of the older aged members.
