The machine records pressure, light intensity, temperature and a number of other physical qualities.

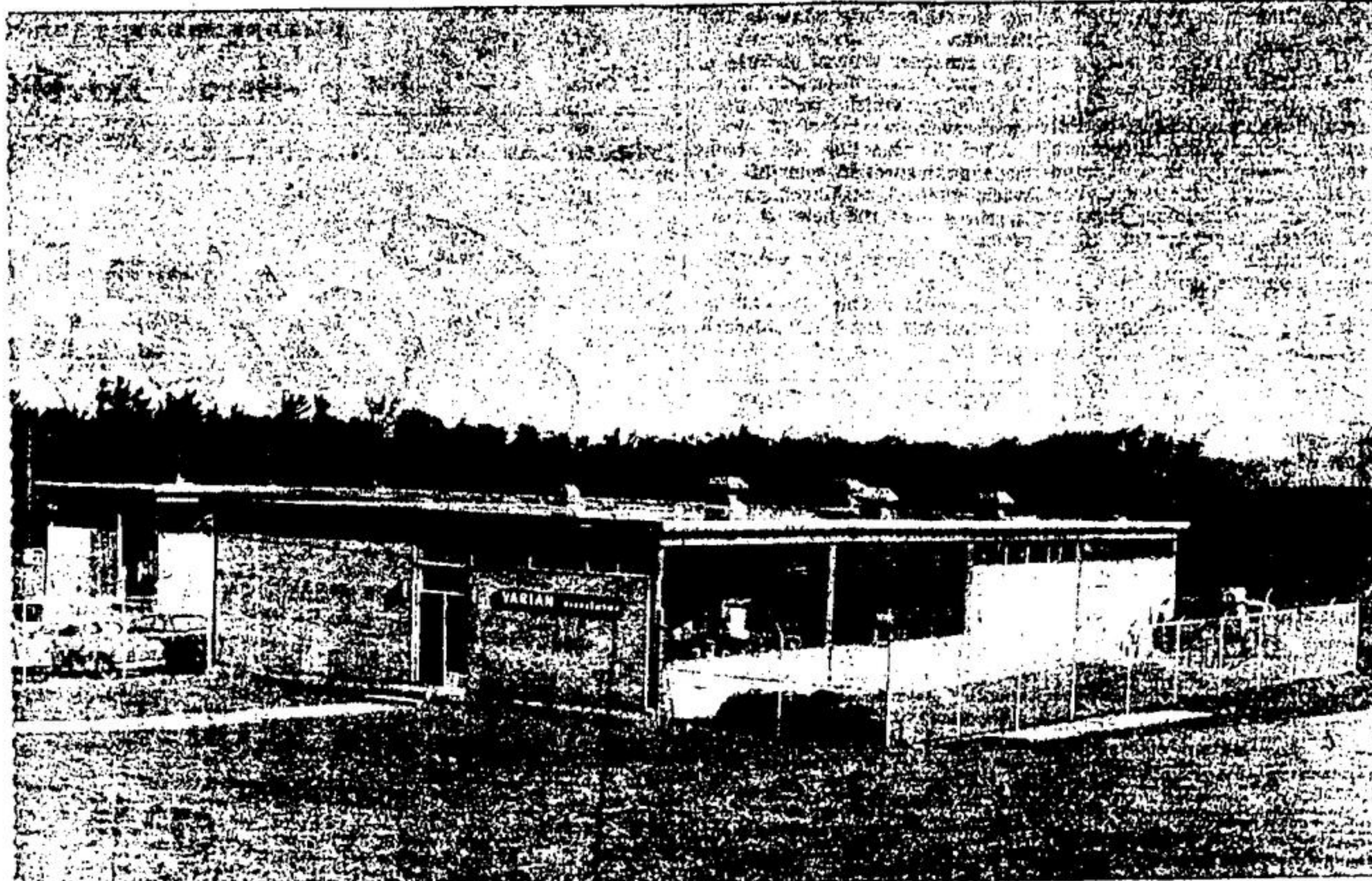
### HARRY STUCKEY, 69 NORVAL MAN'S FATHER

### NOW EMPLOY 43 PEOPLE IN KLYSTRON PRODUCTION

Varian Associates of Canada Limited has a 1000 square foot addition to its River Drive plant nearing completion.

The addition, being made by McNally Construction, represents a 10 per cent increase in plant area for the firm which commenced manufacturing operations in Georgetown last October.

The addition, part of the company's general expansion plan, will house special development engineering work planned by the company which manufactures klystron tube equipment used in radar, guided missile systems, TV and microwave communications systems.

The Georgetown Varian plant is a subsidiary of Varian Associates, a California Company with headquarters in Palo Alto. The parent company is one of the world's largest manufacturers of klystron tubes and special laboratory instrumentation. The Georgetown plant now has 43 employees and is producing approximately 150 klystron tubes a month.

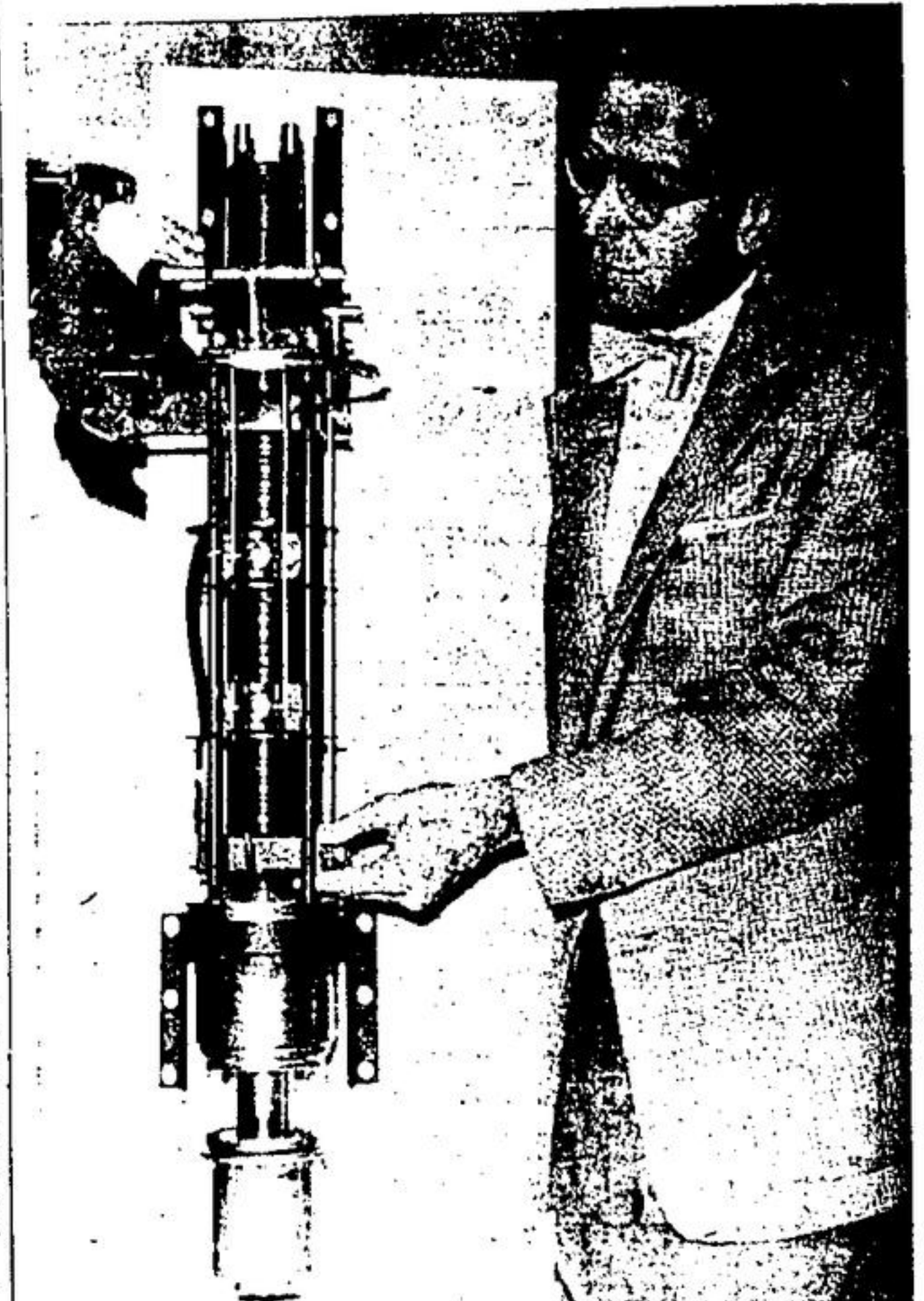
Specialists on loan from the parent company have been supervising the initial operation in Geor-

getown and training Canadian personnel in the specialized field of klystron development and manufacturing. It is planned that management and operating functions will be assumed by an all-Canadian staff after the completion of the necessary training program.

In keeping with this policy, the appointment of B. H. Breckenridge, 33 Henry Street, to the position of assistant general manager has been announced. Mr. Breckenridge has been business manager for the company. He previously had been associated with Fleet Manufacturing Ltd., Carrier Engineering Ltd., and Canadian International Paper Co. Ltd. in various accounting and financial management positions.

The first of the parent company personnel scheduled to return to California will be Ralph Woodward, 5 Orchard Blvd., who has been in charge of the test department. He is returning to Palo Alto in September and will be replaced by George Frost, 49 Main Street S., who came to Varian from Defence Research Board, Ottawa, nearly a year ago.
