CHURCH HEARS ABOUT SCOTT MISSION WORK

The WMS had charge of the church service on Sunday morning, and were pleased to have such a splendid congregation, also with visitors from other places. President Mrs. Leslie Giffen was in charge and the choir consisted of WMS ladies. Scripture was read by Mrs. John Tuddell. Prayer was offered by Mrs. J. H. Hunter. The solo "Stranger of Galilee" was beautifully sung by Mrs. Harold Learmonth of Hornby, accompanied by Carman Cantelon, at the piano. The speaker was Mrs. Ziedman, who certainly impressed her listeners as she told of the work she and her husband are doing at the Scott Mission on Spadina Avenue in Toronto. Her text was from eleventh chapter of Hebrews. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for" and she said it was through faith they have been able to accomplish their work. Their Mission was started in 1912 to the Jewish people and was called after Dr. John McPherson Scott. In the depression days people were fainting from hunger and want and the first day the Mission fed 135 men with 30 gallons of turkey gib-

let stew and before long the number rose to one thousand men. They feed hungry people all year round, 3000 men every day, in the winter time 6000 men. They give out clothing and groceries, and anything and everything the Lord gives them to do, all by faith from God, she said, is sufficient for all our needs.
