**Dairy Queen New Feature at C.N.E.**

A competition will be held this year at the CNE to select a Dairy Queen. Jointly sponsoring the competition with organizations representing the dairy industry is the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, the CNE and the Toronto Telegram. The selection is under the charge of Everett Biggs, Dairy Commissioner for the Province of Ontario.

A competition amongst potential dairy maids will be held each night of the exhibition for ten nights and then on the eleventh night the top girl for each of the five dairy breeds will compete for the supreme championship -- as dairy queen of the fair.

The Holstein, Ayrshire, Guernsey, Jersey & Dual Purpose Short-horn Breed Associations are selecting girls to represent them. In the case of the Holstein, the dairy maids are being selected by the County Holstein Breeders' Clubs for Peel, Halton, Wentworth, Lincoln, Welland, Haldimand, Brant, Waterloo, Wellington and Grey contestants will be picked from farther afield, some of them from the Province of Quebec.

The winner amongst the five girls each night will be interviewed in front of the main grandstand at the CNE. The top girl for each breed will be selected by the judges to compete on the final night.

The girls must be real dairy maids for they will be required to prepare the cow for milking, assemble the milking machine, milk the cow takes the machine apart and properly sterilize it.

The public will be given an opportunity to guess the total weight of milk produced by the cows in the competition and the total weight produced by the cow for each breed.

Prizes totalling \$1,000 will be offered for this phase of the competition.

**Work Starts, Addition Guelph Fibreglas Plant**

An immediate start is to be made on building a 50,000 square foot addition to the Guelph plant of Fibreglas Canada Ltd.

The contract for the building of the addition has been awarded to Wolford Construction Ltd., of Guelph, which also constructed the plastics plant for Smith & Stone, an associate company of Fibreglas.

The new building -- a valuable addition to Guelph's industrial growth, will be erected on property south of York Road adjoining the present buildings of Fibreglas. Fergus MacKay, manager of Fibreglas, reported as a result of increased activity in manufacture, certain auxiliary operations will have to be moved to the new buildings. The company's Filter Line will also be transferred to the new buildings to make way for Fibreglas' expanded yarn manufacturing space.

"Studies on additional operations are also taking place," revealed Mr. MacKay, information on this phase will not be released until a later date when the company has established something concrete.

First information on the plans for the new building was released earlier this month through Mr. Cutten. At that time it was noted that when Fibreglas came to Guelph in February, 1952, it built, at a cost of \$2 million, a modern plant covering 600,000 square feet. That original plant is only 10,000 feet larger than the proposed new plant, a comparison which gives some idea of the importance of the start on the new job.
