Bad Crash at Limehouse Sends Six to Hospital

The intersection of the Sixth Line and the Limehouse road was the scene of a serious accident just Saturday, August 11th, involving a pick-up truck and a late model car. The car, a 1955 Pontiac, driven by Kees Van Lier, age 23, of 34 John St. East, Georgetown, was proceeding west towards Limehouse at about 2 p.m. when a light truck travelling north on the 6th line entered the intersection at the same time as the Van Lier car.

The truck, driven by Bruce Mc-Clure, age 32, of R. R. 3, George town, struck the car broadside. The impact rolled the Van Lier car over twice and hurled it into the ditch where it came to rest on
