### Four Teenagers in Early Morning Accident

Four teenagers were injured in an accident three miles north of Streetsville early Saturday morning when the car in which they were riding, crashed through a fence to escape the path of an oncoming vehicle.

The driver, an Erin resident, said that he swerved to avoid hitting the other car and lost control. The car swung away from the travelled portion of the road and plunged through a rail fence leaving two broken hydro poles in its wake.

The driver suffered an injured right knee and a cut hand. A Limehouse resident suffered only bruises to his right arm. Two Georgetown girls were also injured in the crash, one receiving a badly scraped right leg, the other a fractured right ankle and bruised left shoulder.

Police from Port Credit, Streetsville, Toronto Twp. and Milton investigated the accident. Damage done to the car amounted to \$450.
