


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2.30 P.M. - GREENWOOD CEMETERY

Jim Jones, club president, explained details of the meet over a loud speaker system, and results were announced during the afternoon.
Mayor Jack Armstrong and Dick Licala, one of the strongest supporters of the fund drive which made the pool possible, were the hit of the afternoon as they competed in a "long distance" swim across the pool. Haltonville Boy Loses Left Eye in Mishap
Ten year old Richard Britton, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. O. Britton, of Haltonville was operated on Monday, August 20th by doctors at the Toronto Hospital for Sick Children who found it necessary to remove the boy's left eye after a mishap at the Britton home the previous Friday.
Richard was wrestling with his 15 year old brother, Ted, outside his father's service station when his eye was injured by a pair of shears lying on the ground.
The youth was rushed to Milton Private Hospital where Dr. Fitz-Gerald examined him.
At the request of the doctor the OPP transported the boy to the Toronto hospital. While Const. Ray Andrews radioed ahead for an ambulance to Oakville, Cons. Charles McLean drove him and his mother the former Jeanette Farmer of Georgetown to the Queen Elizabeth highway. They were met there by Morden's ambulance from Oakville.
The ambulance had driven only as far as Cocksville when fate dealt its second blow. As it was coming to a halt at the traffic lights at Mississauga Road, the ambulance crashed into the rear of a car at Richard's home.
Richard received minor cuts and bruises in the collision while his mother received leg injuries.
The boy and his mother were transferred to a Port Credit ambulance and rushed into the Toronto hospital.
Richard was reportedly doing nicely after the operation in which he lost the sight of his eye.

Car Buyers Favouring Power Operated Devices
Canadians, according to one of the country's leading automobile manufacturers, are demanding more and more of the "extras" in their cars this year.
These include such items as automatic transmissions controlled by push buttons, power brakes, power steering, V-8 engines and even power-operated seats and window lifts.
According to Chrysler of Canada statisticians, their new car sales have disclosed an increasing demand for all of these items.
In the low priced lines, the push button automatic transmission was installed in 40 per cent of all orders received this year, compared with 21 per cent in the 1955 models. Demand for V-8 engines rose from 17 per cent to around 44 per cent.
Full-time coaxial power steering and power brakes are especially popular with Canadians buying the medium-priced lines. Demand for power steering accounted for 31 per cent of all cars in this group compared with 21 per cent in 1955 models, while power brakes were stipulated for 40 per cent of vehicles in this series as against 21 per cent for the 1955 models. The V-8 engine and push button automatic transmission are standard equipment in this line.
In the higher priced models, power steering was demanded by a large majority of purchasers, ranging from 83 to 97 per cent of all orders, with power brakes being specified for more than half of the cars ordered in these series.
Increases were also noted for cars equipped with power operated seats and windows, although these are still in relatively small demand.

Soccer Jets Seem Assured As Champs
The Georgetown Jets took both ends of a week-end double-header played in Georgetown park last Saturday and Sunday to remain on top of the soccer league with only two games yet to play.
The Jets are undefeated and need only a tie in one of their remaining contests to clinch first position and the cup.
In Saturday's game the Jets led to a 6-2 victory over Hollandia in a fast moving, close checking affair in which Georgetown scored early and were never headed.
Sammy Engles scored three goals to lead in the scoring and was perhaps the outstanding player on the field. Pat Haugarty, John Miller and Terry Slaven each tallied once to complete the Georgetown scoring.
Georgetown also displayed some great defensive work sparked by the checking of James Monteath.
Jam's Crichton, though kept off the score sheet, turned in a good effort for a person who came off a sick bed to take part in the game.
On Sunday the Jets went against the Galt Green Whites, who pht up more of a battle but were unable to cope with a completely recovered Jim Crichton.
Crichton scored two and Sam Engles one as Georgetown edged Galt 3-2. The Jets defence again stood out to hold Galt to their two hard earned goals.
A good crowd is expected to witness next Saturday's game when the Jets play host to King William III of Guelph.
