Some twenty four ladies enjoyed a very interesting and instructive talk by Mrs. Jamieson of the Halton Health Unit at the regular monthly meeting held in Limehouse memorial hall on Thursday p.m., September 6. Mrs. Jamieson explained the work of the Health Unit and especially her own work in the county.

The roll call for the meeting was an article for the bazaar to be held in the autumn. A letter was received from Dr. Hirschmanova, appealing for help. \$10 was voted to this very worthy cause. Mrs. Frank Brown and Mrs. E. Sanford were elected to attend, as delegates the area convention in Guelph, September 25 and 26. The bazaar, library, flower or fruit and garden conveners all reported on the work on hand . . . also the fair committee.

Mrs. N. Ruddle took charge of the programme and called on the different conveners for their two minute reports and Mrs. Sanford for current events.

The meeting closed with God Save the Queen after which all enjoyed a social half hour over a cup of tea, sandwiches and cake, provided by the social committee for the month — Mrs. J. S. Noble and Mrs. E. Karn.

The W.I. of Limehouse believe in starting from the ground up, so for some years have sponsored the school gardens in the district. Beginning in the spring with children not yet attending school, but who will be starting in September, and all classes up to those leaving, after obtaining their entrance.

Mr. Pargeter of Acton has been the judge of these gardens for years and the Limehouse ladies are very grateful to Mr. Pargeter for the interest he has taken and the time he has given to this work. This year he donated a cup which must be won three years in succession by one pupil before that pupil can retain the cup. This year the pupil having the largest number of points was Patsy Crawford, of R. R. 3, Georgetown, winner of the cup for this year — she was presented with a book from the W.I.

Mrs. S. Gisby, convener of the school gardens, selects the seeds, etc. in the spring and they are given to any school child who will undertake to make and attend to a small garden plot. During the summer, Mrs. Gisby and Mr. Pargeter make a tour of these gardens and points are given as Mr. Pargeter judged them. This year there were 41 gardens. Some were never planted, some neglected, but most of them made a showing of some sort, a few were really beautiful to behold, while others show how little interest the pupil had in the work.

Saturday, September 8th the children gathered the best from these gardens and had a display in Limehouse Memorial Hall. Mr. Pargeter judged the different classes in the afternoon and on the evening parents and friends were invited to attend. After viewing the garden displays of flowers and vegetables, all enjoyed a program consisting of musical numbers by Miss Ruth McBride — a piano solo, and a flute solo by Peter Glynn accompanied by Mrs. J. Roughley, a demonstration by Billy Sanford.
