Food and Your Heart



The Public Health experts pointed out that entirely too many people, especially men, are dying of coronaries before their time ... in their 40's and 50's ... even in their 30's. U.S. experts say we are in the grip of a "coronary epidemic" and that coronary disease is the "greatest public health problem of our time." The rise has made research on coronary disease a "must". An army of investigators in a score of countries is seeking ways of treating and preventing it.

But research has not yet uncovered the whole coronary disease story. They are, however, uncovering circumstances that have a good deal to do with the rise in coronary deaths. One of the researchers who is taking a series of studies which have taken them to almost every corner of the world. The results of which show that a diet too rich in fats seems to be the biggest contributing factor.
