**Chatting...**

with M. H. B.

**HAVING JUST** finished gathering one last bouquet from the fall flowers before the frost strikes them, reminds me to tell you of the phenomenal flower I saw growing in the garden of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Walters, 27 Durham Street last week. It was a nicotine plant - boasting about three hundred blooms. The plant was much larger than nicotine usually grows, with the stems branching out to make it look more like a little shrub than a flower. I hadn't known before Mrs. Walters mentioned it, but nicotine is also known as "moon flower." This name is derived from the fact that the nicotine blossoms unfold after sundown. This is the time too, when they give out their lovely fragrance. Even a few plants can fill a whole garden with perfume at dusk. The most commonly grown variety of nicotine is white, but Mrs. Walters tells me they have had quite good success with growing the coloured varieties as well. The "jumbo-size" nicotine which has been blooming in their garden since July started out as a little plant last fall which Mr. and Mrs. Walters took in the house and nursed along during the winter...

**WHILE STILL ON** the subject of flowers... I know this hasn't been a particularly good summer for most varieties. The growing season was too cool, wet, and all too short. But it did agree with one flower which is usually quite tricky to grow around this part of the country. I refer to sweet peas. Mrs. Bob Souther brought me a lovely bouquet of them last week. Phoning to thank her for the posies, I mentioned that I had never had any luck trying to grow sweet peas, and she enlightened me about the weather factor. Mrs. Souther's home was originally in Edmonton. Out there they have no difficulty whatever in growing sweet peas. These flowers liked the cool climate out there so well they thrived from a shallow planting of a couple of inches, whereas to grow sweet peas successfully here, you have to dig a deep trench and go through quite a complicated rigamarole. So, had I known what the summer was going to be like, I would have planted sweet peas again this year - and who knows, we might at last have met with success...

**THE FLOWERS** at the Fair on Saturday were beautiful too... in fact the whole exhibit hall display was excellent. So much so that I do not like to single out any one section for comment... but just on the off-chance that you did not see the clever display made by the Esquimes Women's Institute, I'd like to tell you a little bit about it... Entitled "The House That Health Built", the central theme of the display was nutrition... a subject very close to the heart of every homemaker. This being the case, the ladies made their complete display from food. There was the little house "stuccoed" with oatmeal, which had overlapping slices of brown bread for the roof and a generous slab of butter for the chimney. The portals of the cheese-slice doorway were tiny bottles of cream, facing the walk flagstoned with squares of cheese and bologna loaf. The roadway into the garage was edged with half-egg shells and the drive was gravelled with dried peas and beans. Complete in every detail, the wee windows in the house were curtained with lettuce leaves, while a banana crescent moon shone benignly down on the nutritious homestead from a star studded sky...

**THE TRIP OUT WEST** taken by Mrs. Florence Curtis, about which you have been reading in "Chatting" for the past couple of weeks, brought back vividly to mind the trip we had out to Jasper several years ago. The Canadians Weekly Newspapers Association convention being held out there enabled us to take the trip. Certainly it will always be one of the highlights of our life - and I know that everyone who sees the Rockies feels the same way...

I imagine the country looks exactly the way it did when the first explorers discovered it. Sailing back into "civilization" again, you had the feeling you had visited a different country altogether... An amazing land, this Canada of ours...

The little 1489 CC. 4 cylinder car performed brilliantly for 12 straight hours covering 1700.57 miles at an average of 141.71 MPH for the run. This includes stops for mechanical check up and refueling. Gasoline performance averaged better than 25 miles per gallon. The chassis of the MG is basically standard, as are suspension, wheels, brakes and steering. The engine is not supercharged.
