The little 1489 CC, 4 cylinder car performed brilliantly for 12 straight hours covering 1700.57 miles at an average of 141.71 MPH for the run. This includes stops for mechanical check up and refueling. Gasoline performance averaged better than 25 miles per gailon. The chassis of the MG is basically standard, as are suspension, wheels, brakes and steering. The engine is not supercharged.
