The clogging of a coronary vessel is preceded by a narrowing of the artery. This narrowing occurs because a fatty deposit starts to line the inside of the blood vessel.

This deposit is the real cause of coronary attack. Researchers want to know how and why the deposit gets there. It is not the natural result of aging, for it is not found in the arteries of many old people.

There has been many theories as to the origin of this fatty deposit. For example, the strain of modern life, smoking, lack of exercise, and sex hormone changes but Dr. Keys and other researchers feel diet is the principal factor. Their reason is simple. The fat in the arteries must come from somewhere.

The reason he became interested in diet as a cause of coronary disease is because during the war in countries with severe food rationing there had been a sharp drop in coronary deaths.

This pointed to plain over-eating as a possible cause of coronary disease, but because many people of normal weight who do not overeat died of this affliction, this didn't give the complete answer.

Breaks 22 Speed Records

Among the records broken were 4 set by George Barringer on these same Salt Beds in 1940. The records had withstood all challengers for 16 years. With these new speed achievements the Austin-Healey now holds every record in its class from 1 to 3,000 miles. This model is a slightly streamlined version of the standard Austin-Healey sports car with all basic specifications standard, including head lights and tail lights.
