WITNESSES COMMENT ON FLAG BELIEFS

An open letter to the Editor of the Georgetown Herald:

Dear Sir:

There appears to be concern on the part of some over the attitude of Jehovah's Witnesses with respect to flags and other patriotic symbols. This concern was in evidence at the recent assembly held in Orangeville during the week-end of September 21-23. We will go on record at this point and clearly state our position.

Jehovah's Witnesses are Christians. We have a Christian responsibility to render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and this we do. The flag is a symbol of constitutional democratic government under which we exercise our liberties, and we have the greatest respect for both. We exercise our liberties honestly and in the open.

Jehovah's Witnesses respect the rights and beliefs of others and will do nothing improper in regard to either. We also believe the Bible, and will do our best to teach it and respect for godly principles at a time when local and national events are rife with adult and juvenile delinquency and other acts of disrespect to the legally constituted government. We are preachers of a good news about the Kingdom of Jehovah God and His Son Christ Jesus which will benefit all humankind. We look for that Kingdom to come here upon earth within the lifetime of those now living. That is why the main lecture of our assembly was on the subject "What Will Armageddon mean for You?"

Jesus said: "My Kingdom is not of this world." That is why we avoid taking part in worldly politics. For the same reason our people are put in Russian slave labour camps. They refuse to worship the state or any symbols of the state which is required of them in that country. However we do show proper respect for the law and the institutions of any government.

During the past month two other similar assemblies were held in public buildings in Toronto. No instances of disrespect are on record on either of these occasions or at any other time when Jehovah's Witnesses have rented public buildings in which to hold their conventions.

Mr. Jennings and Betty Murphy were married twenty eight years ago, Mrs. Jennings survives him as do his two sons, Jack and Allan who live at the home place and a daughter, Mary, Mrs. C. L. Rasberry. A brother Jim lives in Acton and there are four sisters in England.

Funeral service was held at the Harold C. McClure funeral home on Thursday, September 20th at 3 p.m. conducted by Rev. Morgan McFarlane. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
