The News Presents ...

The Junior Farmer News in its latest issue, has this to say about Halton's Mac Sprowl:

Robert McIsaac Sprowl, known to most people as Mac, one of the new members of the provincial executive this year can boast of being a fourth generation member of one of Halton county's pioneer families. Mac's great-grandparents came to Canada from Scotland and settled in the Acton area in 1820. The Sprowl's 165-acre farm is now located one quarter mile from Acton. Fifty head of Shorthorns are kept on the farm.

For five years Mac was a member of 41 Grain Clubs, taking part in the Inter-Club competitions at Guelph in 1947. He has also taken part in many Junior Farmer livestock and seed judging competitions. In 1951 he was a member of the Halton county team that placed third in the Junior Farmer Judging competition at the Royal Winter Fair. In 1951, '52 and '53 he judged at the CNE Junior Farmer competitions.

Mac received his education at Bannockburn public school and Acton continuation school. Not content with that he attended night school in Milton where he studied farm machinery, farm business, and farm management; debating and public speaking. He has also taken two short courses at OAC.

The value of such training was obvious when he took part in the Halton County Public Speaking and Debating competitions in 1955.

when he was selected as a member of the county debating team, acting as leader of the Affirmative side. This Halton team won the Junior Farmer Provincial Debating championship when they eliminated Carleton County during the Provincial Conference in March this year.

Music and drama are also among his interests. Since the days when, dressed in his kilt, he sang at local schools and churches, Mac has always been interested in music and has taken part in many piano and singing competitions. For the past four years he has been a member of the Halton Junior Farmer choir. In 1952 he was group leader of two Halton Junior Farmer square dance sets, both of which reached the finals in competition at the Royal Winter Fair. His interest in drama began while still attending Acton Continuation School. Then in 1954 he participated in the County Jrs. Drama Festival, as a member of the cast of Acton's play, "The Special Guest."

Fond of sport, Mac played basketball; hockey and softball at high school. For four years he played hockey for the Acton Junior Farmers in the Halton inter-club league. The Acton team of which he was a member won the County Championship for 1954-1955.

A World Traveller

Frequently introduced as a world traveller Mac claims he has walked on the soil of ten other countries, as well as travelling Canada from the Pacific to the Atlantic. In 1951 he was a member of the Lincoln County bus trip which toured the eastern United States. In 1953 he toured Michigan.

The following year Mac was awarded one of the two Nuffield Scholarships offered annually to Canadian farm youth. This entitled him to spend six months in Great Britain studying agriculture. That year he travelled in England, Wales, Scotland, North Ireland, Eire, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland and France. Since his return he has travelled across Ontario from Owen Sound to Kempenville showing slides and talking about his trip. To date he has shown them 75 times before a total audience of about 5,800 people.

Since joining the Acton Junior Farmers in 1945 Mac has held many offices including that of secretary, treasurer, president and press reporter. In 1952 he was elected president in the county association and later became county director to the provincial association. At the annual meeting in March this year he was elected to the provincial executive. He is also one of the representatives of the Junior Farmers Association of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture Board.

Despite all these Junior Farmer activities, Mac has found time to take an active part in other organizations in the community. In 1953 he served as president of Acton Fair, the youngest in the province that year. He is also second vice president of the Halton Federation of Agriculture, a director of the Halton Crop Improvement Association, a member of the Acton L.O.L. and a member of the Acton Rotary Club. He is a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, Acton, and belongs to the Young People's Society.

The Sprowl home has been a busy place during the past ten years. Mac's younger brother, Calvin, has also taken an active part in Junior Farmer work and has held every office in the Acton club. Quite often both Mac and Calvin are away at the same time at church or Junior Farmer events, local, county or provincial.

Parallel differences in coronary disease have been found within Canada. In 1954 Ontario had 14,351 coronary-disease deaths. Quebec, with a nearly equal population had but 6885. Differences in diet may have had a part in this striking contrast. Dr. Keys concludes that in any event it seems inescapable that the recent increase in coronary disease in many countries is the result in great part of too luxurious a diet with too high a proportion of fat-rich meats and fried foods and fat laden gravies, dressings and desserts. He continues to say that of course there is still much to be learned about the role of fats in coronary disease, for instance all fats may not be equally harmful but I think it is clear that we must overhaul our diet if we would reduce the immense toll of coronary disease. Included are findings of Dr. Keys in this series to show that independent investigation all over the world is backing up the nutritional approach that chiropractors have held for 30 years. Because of the importance of heart disease, these days we have an endocardigraph in the office.
