## **FOOD** and YOUR HEART

(Last of the Series)

Parallel differences in coronary disease have been found within Canada. In 1954 Ontario had 14,351 coronary-disease deaths. Quebec, with a nearly equal population had but 6885. Differences in

diet may have had a part in this striking contrast. 
