**ST. MARYS MAN KILLED  
IN CAR-TRAIN CRASH**

A trip to the International Plowing Match at Brooklin, ended in tragedy for a St. Marys' family last Thursday when their car was bumped onto a CNR crossing on No. 7 Hwy., and into the path of a fast-moving passenger train.

Dead is Nelson Lamb, 46, of St. Marys. His sister, Mrs. Olive Cole, 53, is in Peel Memorial Hospital with severe head and chest injuries. The driver of the car Mrs. Helen Lamb, the dead man's wife, is also in Peel Memorial with face lacerations and severe shock.

Mrs. Lamb and three other passengers, Alfred Cole, 54, his daughter, Shirley, 15, and Robert Lamb, 50 of Stratford a brother of the dead man scrambled from the car before the crash.

Mrs. Ruth Broadfoot, 39, of Elora, driver of the car immediately behind the Lamb vehicle escaped with minor injuries. Her father, Samuel Ewing, 77, of Elora, also received no serious injury.

Rev. Alfred Barker, minister of 1st Baptist Church, Georgetown, who was only five cars behind the fatal automobile offered consoling words to the dead man's wife.

Engineer of the train was Gordon Moorehead and the conductor was Ernest Everett, both of Palmerston. Police said crossing warning signals were operating.

**LIMEHOUSE**  
W.I. HEARS HISTORY OF SCHOOL SECTION  
An interesting history of S S No. 9, Esquesing, was given at last week's meeting of Limehouse Women's Institute by Mrs. A. W. Ben ton.  
The first school in this section was built on Lot 18, concession GAV. It was last occupied as a residence by a farm labourer, then was vacant for some years. Mr. Wes Bessey had it torn down and the material used to erect a house on Queen Street in Georgetown.  
The two-storey stone building known as Gibraltar school now in use, was built in 1875 on Lot 21. The upper storey fell into disrepair about 1884, when the teacher was Miss Isabella Gillies. By diligent work of the present trustees and some welcome help from a few ratepayers, this is now a fine two room school again at not too high cost. It has hydro, telephone, piano and music teacher. Chemical toilets were installed in 1940 and the basement dug out and an oil furnace installed. The playground was enlarged when a parcel of land was bought from Newton Ruddell on Lot 20.
