

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Plan Board Palls As Council Stalls

With three council members expressing opposition to a section of the proposed zoning by-law, no decision was made on adopting the by-law at Monday's council meeting.

The by-law was presented to the council by planning board chairman Edwin Wilson, who was accompanied to the meeting by all members of the board.

Mr. Wilson said that no changes had been made in the by-law since it was published in instalments recently in the Herald, but pointed out certain major changes in the zoning map which the board decided at their meeting last week.

The controversial highway strip between Edward Street and Rexway is now designated commercial. A portion of the Moore farm on Main St. N. which fronts the highway has been changed from residential to industrial status. And a service and storage section in the River Drive district has been rezoned as residential.

A lengthy discussion period found Reeve Allen, and Cr. McGilvray outspoken in opposing a by-law clause which would preclude residential building in land reserved for industry. The men were joined in a straw vote by Cr. Hale in their opposition which, apparently, is the only stumbling block to unanimous passing of the by-law by council.

Both the reeve and Cr. McGilvray spoke at various times of the rights of the "little man" and of how unfair it would be to refuse permission for residential building on isolated small lots even though they are in industrial areas.

"No matter what the zoning by-law says, there will be people who have objections," said Mr. Wilson, explaining that a committee of adjustment will be set up to handle these. If individual cases are considered before the by-law becomes law, Georgetown will never have a zoning plan, he said.

Reeve Allen explained that he wants to avoid as many future problems as possible by considering individuals first, and named specific instances where he thought changes should be made.

"If zoning is to be in small bits, it won't be zoning," replied Mr. Wilson.

"We've studied the original plan drawn up by Dr. Faludi, revised it, and this is our best suggestion," said board member Bob McMenemy. "I don't think anyone on the planning board expected to be asked to throw out the plan and create a hodge-podge."

Mayor Armstrong said that he has been told by the Dept. of Planning in Toronto that they frown on residences in industrial areas. The dept. attitude seems to be, he said, that if exceptions are wanted, why do you want a by-law?

"We're hindering free enterprise if a man can't sell his property," said Cr. McGilvray. "I appreciate all the work the planning board has done but I can't see the by-law in its present form."

Council decided to turn the by-law over to the town solicitor for an opinion on its legality. Meanwhile the mayor suggested that the planning board reconsider their submission in the light of the evening's discussion, while each councillor gave it earnest consideration and prepare to make a decision at a future meeting.

Intimating that his board would have no further suggestions to offer, Mr. Wilson expressed disappointment at the turn the discussion had taken.

"We appreciate the thoughts of those who are opposed, but neither we or anyone else has found a by-law which can be 100% acceptable to every resident," he said.

OKAY SERVICE STATION AND ADDITION TO IGA

Granting of two building permits held up for some time by council because they would not conform with provisions of the proposed zoning by-law, was made at council meeting on October 24.

With the highway strip from Edward St. to Rexway now planned as commercial, a permit will be given to McColl-Frontenac Oil Co. for a service station which the company plans to erect on land being purchased from W. G. Sutherland and A. E. Colman at the Rexway corner.

The town also will allow the IGA Supermarket to build a temporary addition at the rear of the store, with the store owner and operators Bruce Williamson and Bob Caldwell signing an agreement to remove it on any future request by council.

The latter motion was passed against the recommendation of the planning board which at a meeting the previous week decided it could not recommend the addition which will contravene the zoning by-law. A recorded vote found Reeve Allen, Deputy Reeve Sargent and Cr. Noble opposed to granting the permit.

No Serious Injury Bike-Car Accident

Two public school children from the Swanek subdivision suffered multiple cuts and bruises Monday when the bicycle on which they were riding ran into the front of a car at the intersection of Water Street and No. 7 Highway at about 12:45 p.m.

The driver of the car, William Emmerson, 27, who was travelling west on Guelph Street and intending to make a left turn into Water Street, stopped to let the east-bound traffic clear. When the last car had passed he proceeded to make the turn, not noticing the two children on the bicycle coasting down Guelph street hill behind the east bound cars.

Trevor Smith, age 10, who was steering the bike spotted the Emmerson car and braked but the speed at which he was travelling plus the added weight of his sister Marilyn, age 7, carried bike and children full force into the front of the car.

Doctor J. H. Chamberlain was called to the scene where he treated the youngsters for numerous minor injuries. Constable Nelson Trafford investigated the accident.

Co-proprietors of the IGA Food-liner in the Georgetown Plaza, Bob Caldwell and Bruce Williamson, reported that nothing was missing after thieves entered the store on Monday and blew the door open on a small safe at the front of the building.

Constable Harley Lowe of the Georgetown police discovered the break-in while checking the doors in this area at about 2:40 a.m. He entered the premises and found the safe had been tipped over and the door blown out. On investigating the rear of the building Const. Lowe found two large cardboard boxes containing about \$500 worth of cartons of cigarettes. These boxes were close to an exit and ready for removal indicating that the officer had frightened off the thieves before the cigarettes could be loaded into their car.

The safe, which contained no money, was located under a candy counter. In a closer inspection by the proprietors, candies were discovered in various parts of the store, evidently hurled there by the force of the blast.

Police are continuing their inspection of the incident.

SMASH DAMAGES PRINCIPAL'S CAR

A collision at the intersection of Albert and McNabb Sts. on Wednesday, October 17th, resulted in considerable damage to the left side of a car driven by William Kinrade, principal of the Howard Wrigglesworth public school.

Mr. Kinrade was driving north on McNabb Street at about 7:45 p.m. and approaching the intersection only two blocks from his home when a vehicle proceeding east on Albert Street, driven by Ted Wagner of Esqueving Twp. continued on across the intersection and rammed the Kinrade car crushing in the door and fender.

Neither driver was injured in the accident in which an estimated \$100 damage was done to the principals car. Constable Nelson Trafford of the Georgetown police investigated the mishap.
