Meanwhile the mayor suggested that the planning board reconsider their submission in the light of the evening's discussion, while each councillor gave it earnest consideration and prepare to make a decision at a future meeting.

Intimating that his board would have no further suggestions to offer. Mr. Wilson expressed disappointment at the turn the discussion had taken.

"We appreciate the thoughts of those who are opposed, but neither we or anyone else has found a bylaw which can be 100% acceptable to every resident" he said.
