Your boy will be asked to produce a birth certificate before the season gets under way so why not send for one now. Certificates are not needed at registration time.

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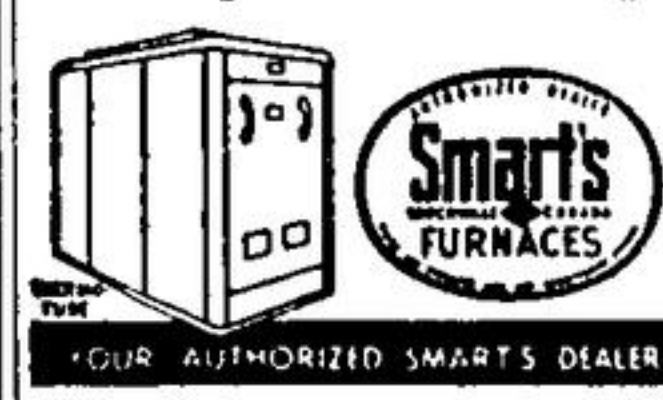

As Truck Hits Train**

An Islington truck driver who was unable to stop after spotting a CNR freight train only a few yards from a crossing two miles east of Norval had his ten ton trailer wrecked when torn away from its tractor unit.

When driver Donald Kidd, 45, of Jopling Ave. S., Islington, tried to beat the train across, after discovering he was too near the crossing to try to stop, it smashed into the side of the trailer, carrying 4000 bricks . . . scattering them half a mile from the tracks.

The impact broke air pipes at the front of the engine which applied the brakes and brought the train to a halt. The engine co-catcher was also bent. Engineer Noel Sevigny, 60, of 6th Street, New Toronto, said that he and his fireman had to duck when bricks smashed through the cab windows. The train was going at 50 m.p.m. when it hit the truck.

"I thought hitting that load would knock us off the rails, but the impact didn't even slow us up," the engineer said. "I breathed easier when I found no one had been killed. It's the first time I've ever hit anything in 37 years of railroad-ing."

The truck driver was uninjured but for minor bruises from showering bricks.
