Canadian Artist Phone Book Cover Illustrator

A brand new cover illustration, "regional" in appearance, greeted many Georgetown telephone users this week when for the first time they had an opportunity to look at the latest edition of the telephone directory, now being distributed here.

The drawing, featuring the Credit River near Huttonville, is the work of Canadian artist Albert Cloutier, ARCA. L. G. Denby, Bell Telephone manager for this region, explained. The illustration replaces the figure of the "Spirit of Communication", which adorned the front covers of local directories for many years.

There are 7,271 new and changed listings in the 1956 edition of the telephone book, according to Mr. Denby. "This directory is for immediate use," he said. "We suggest you save yourself time and trouble by dispensing with the old directory right away."

The Bell manager also reminded telephone users to bring their "Blue Books of Telephone Numbers" up to date by comparing them with the 1956 directory. Fresh copies of these blue books, regular and pocket size, can be obtained from Bell business offices.

The continuing expansion of this area, indicated by the increase in the number of telephone directories needed for distribution this year. Altogether, some 14,100 copies are being delivered in the area covered by the book, as against about 13,550 in 1955.

The 26th annual provincial 4-H inter-club competitions held at the Ontario Agricultural College on Friday of last week saw 253 teams, representing 11,756 young farm people, enrolled in 4-H agricultural projects, participating in some one of the eight different competitions. All sections of southern Ontario were represented, from Renfrew in the east to Essex and Bruce in the west. It was an outstanding achievement to be selected to represent some one of the 4-H clubs dotted over the province. Then following a limited amount of coaching, they met in friendly competition to determine who were the "tops." It was an inspiring sight to look into the sea of faces that crowded into the dining hall for the evening dinner, when the Hon. Wm. Goodfellow, Ontario's new minister of agriculture, was the speaker. The genial minister let the young people in on a secret. "In my early youth," he stated, "I had the ambition to sometime become Ontario's minister of agriculture. After 34 years in public service, that ambition has been realized. "No vocation," he stated, "needs better training, in this the middle of the twentieth century than agriculture. I would like to be in your shoes tonight," he added, "if for no other reason than that I might live to see the advances that will take place by the year 2000."

To return to the results of the competitions — well, in our opinion, they were all winners. Unfortunately everyone can't be first.

Halton Tops Swine
In a competition which brought together 14 teams, Halton's Lynne

Coulter and George Greenless, representing Halton's 4-H Swine Club, took first honours and won the Farmers' Magazine Trophy.

Second on Potatoes
In the 4-H potato inter-club competition, which brought together 18 teams, top honours went to the Durham 4-H Potato Club team. In the second spot was Halton's team of Katharine Merry and Philip Shepherd.

Beef Team Fourth
Forty-one teams from as many different clubs battled it out in the inter-club competition in beef cattle. Here, Halton's team of Sandy Hepburn and Don Mottal placed fourth, the top honours going to the Orangeville 4-H Beef club team of Dufferin County.

65 Teams in Grain
In grain, top honours went to the team representing the Peterborough 4-H grain club, with a score of 953 out of possible 1040. Halton's First Year grain club team of Wm. C. Robinson and Tom Hunter, with a score of 915 were in the tenth spot. Down a few places lower, with a score of 900, was Halton's second year team of Ross Austin and Harvey Pell.

The second largest competition of the day brought together fifty-five teams in the dairy cattle competition, with the top honours going to York's Markham 4-club team. Halton's 4-H Holstein calf club team of Bill Marshall and Don Taylor were in the 13th spot, which is nice going in that sort of competition.

The 4-H tractor club competition brought together 34 teams with top award going to the Puslinch Club team of Wellington County. While West Halton's team of Ron Lee and Bruce Coulson did not land in the prize money, they nevertheless, made a very creditable showing.

Poultry and Forestry
Halton was not represented in either the Poultry or Forestry Club competitions. Nevertheless our readers may be interested in the top awards. Thirteen teams competed in the poultry competition, with first place going to the Picton 4-H poultry club team from Prince Edward County. In the Forestry Club Competition, the Pickering 4-H Forestry Club from Ontario County took the top award away from 13 other teams.

We would be remiss if we did not extend our congratulations to all of the 4-H club members representing Halton — also to their respective club leaders and to their chief coach, Art Bennett. They should all be very proud of the result of their efforts.

The next big 4-H event in Halton will be the Junior Awards Night in the Milton high school on November 30th.
