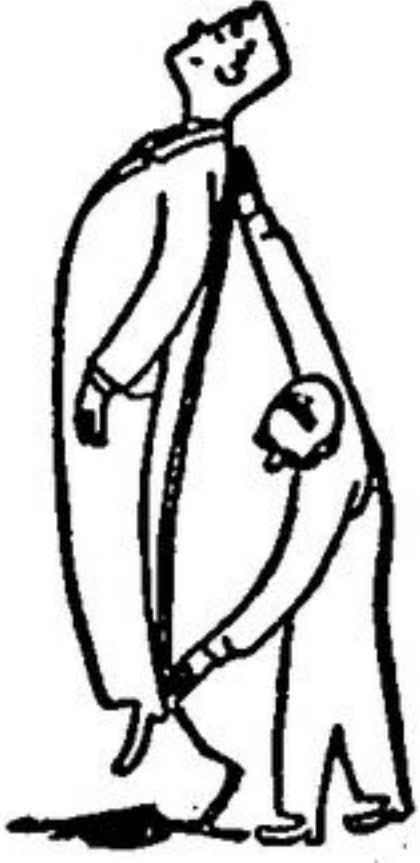


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**OAC PROFESSOR TELLS
HOW TO LANDSCAPE**

Last Wednesday Georgetown Horticultural Society held its regular monthly meeting in the Rose Room with approximately 60 people in attendance. Introduced by Gordon Tee, Professor J. Weall of the OAC in Guelph was the guest speaker taking as his subject "Landscaping the Home." Illustrating his talk with the use of a blackboard and colour drawings, he spoke of the correct and incorrect methods of foundation planting, where to use small trees, shrubs, and where to use large trees and shrubs.

He stressed simplicity, blending of colour and restraint, that is knowing when you have enough in the garden and do not overcrowd. He favoured a perennial border, bringing colour to the garden all year with the use of peonies, iris and lupins, delphiniums and lilies, helium and michaelmas daisies for all season colour. Mr. Weall strongly recommends fall planting for perennials, roses, flowering shrubs, evergreens and most trees stating that in the fall plants have a better chance to get a root system for their spring growth. On behalf of the group present Mr. Bird the president, thanked Mr. Weall for his instructive and informative address. Ernest Ball reported on the joint efforts of the society and the town

council on the planting of shrubs and perennials which were generously donated by the Dominion Seed House. There will be further public planting in various parts of the town and on the various church properties at future dates. This project is a great undertaking and anyone interested in the beautification of this lovely town with a few hours to spare on the weekends can put them to good use by helping. Any assistance given in this great effort will be greatly appreciated. Look into the future and it would be nice to point out to your grandchildren "I helped plant those trees and shrubs."
