Int. Harvester Plans Parts Depot in Halton

Detailed plans for a new \$12,000,000 investment in a super-market parts depot for International Harvester Company of Canada have been announced by R. B. Bradley, president of the company. The depot, to employ approximately 225 persons to be in operation late next year, will be erected on the Guelph Line in Nelson Township where a cloverleaf intersection will link the Queen Elizabeth Way with proposed Highway 401.

According to the president, it will be one of the largest parts depots on the continent, serving not only farm equipment parts but truck and industrial equipment too. It is planned to give 24-hour emergency service on orders for industrial and agricultural equipment.

Termed as "beneficial not only to Nelson but to Halton as a whole and particularly the Hamilton-Nelson area" by Nelson Reeve Harold Adkins, the building will have 215,000 square feet of floor space and a completely electronic system of controls to speed the handling of 70,000 parts.
