Ontario Writer Publishes Her First Historical Novel

A native of Georgetown, Mrs. Harold Bell, who will soon be better known to the reading public by her maiden name, Anne Matthew, will enter the literary world with the publication of her first historical novel, *Wain Wind, West Wind* to appear sometime this month. Mrs. Bell's father operated the drug store now known as MacCormack's. Mr. and Mrs. Ure now live in the Matthews home.

The book, accepted recently by Crown Publishers incorporated, of New York, is Mrs. Bell's first venture outside the field of children's stories.

The novel is set at the beginning of the sixteenth century, just after Cabot's arrival in America, and deals chiefly with the impact that western discoveries had on England and the civilized world of that time. The book also tells of voyages to America and to Antwerp.

The author did most of her research for background material in Hamilton where she has made her home since 1931. Further research was done in Boston and Toronto; the author even visited the places in England described in her book.

The writer majored in English and history during her years as an arts student at University of Toronto. Mr. Bell is a drafting teacher at Central Secondary School.

Mrs. Bell describes herself as a housewife rather than an author and says she has too many outside interests to make a profession of

her writing. She has previously written English and some Canadian history stories for children, which have been published serially.

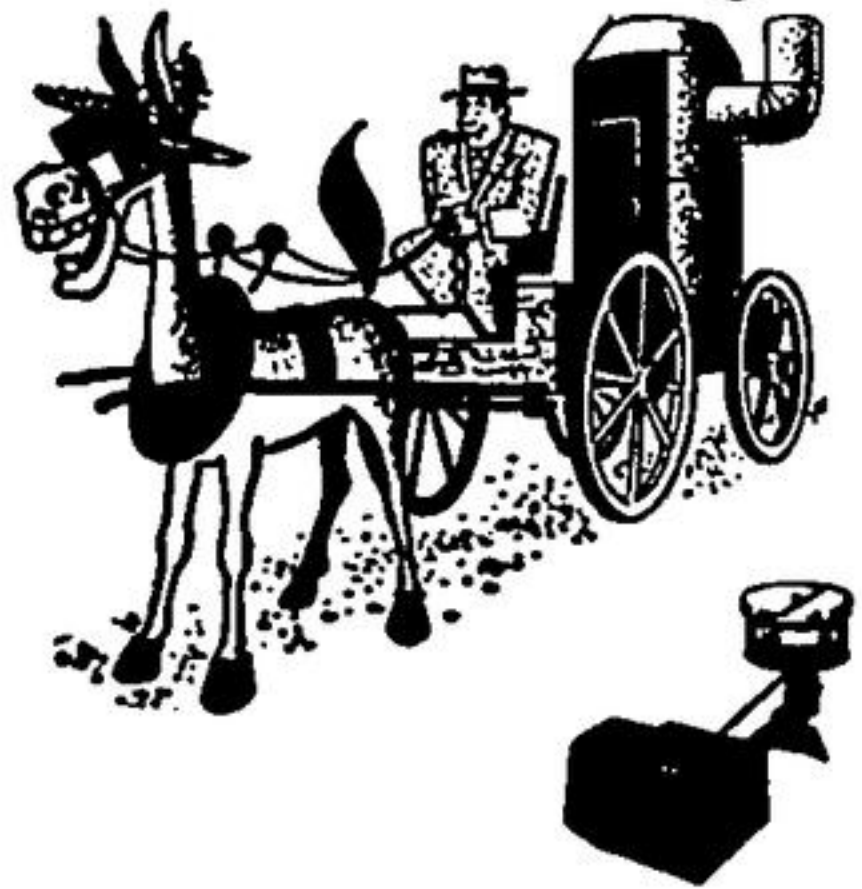
