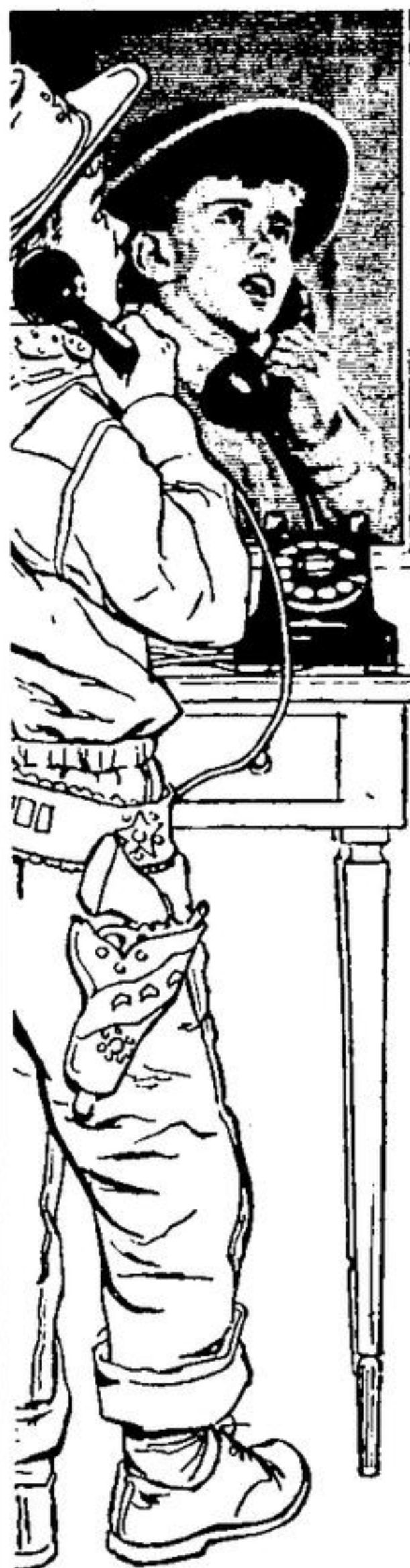

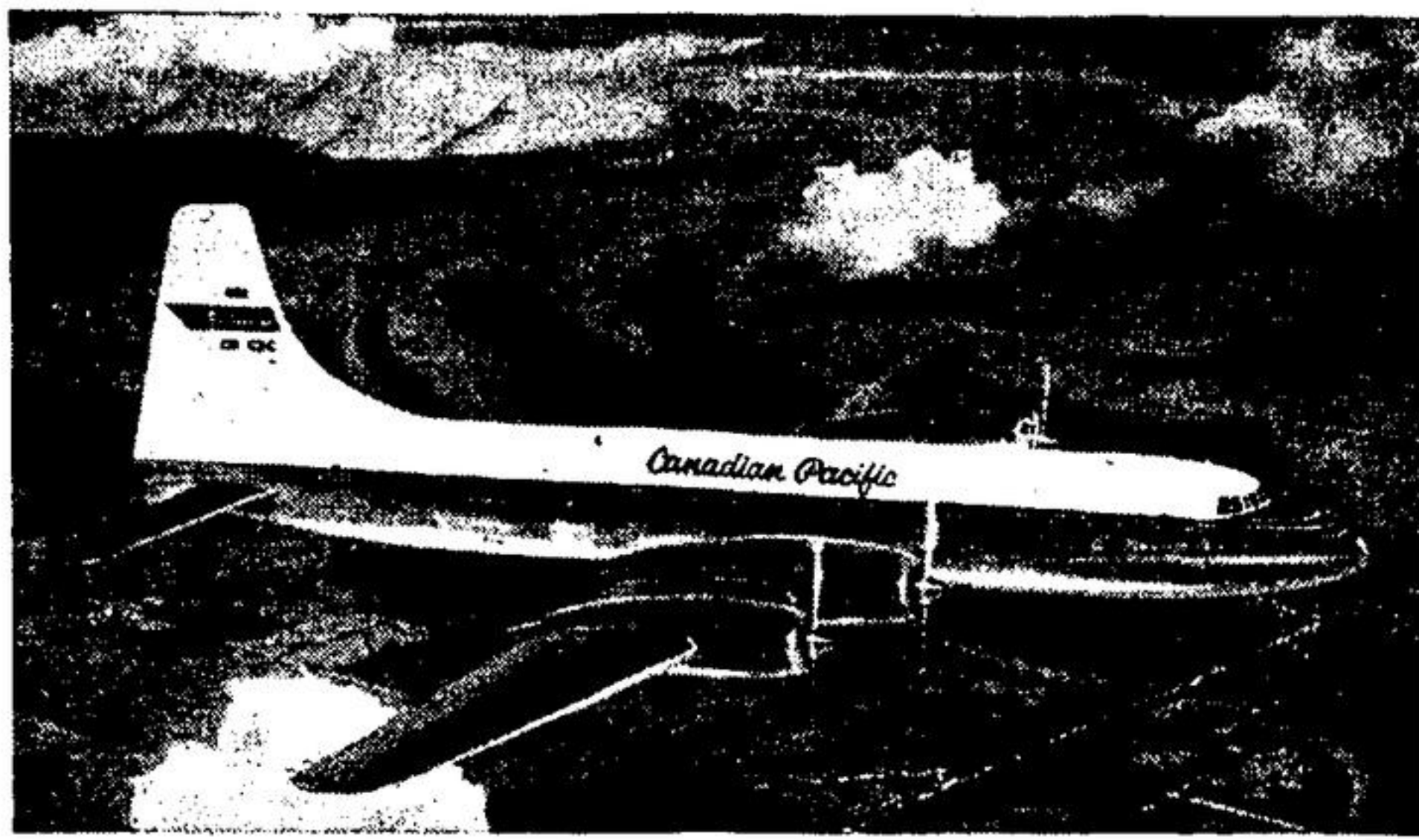

BRITANNIA**—Above is an artist's conception of Canadian Pacific Airlines' Bristol Britannia, the largest and fastest commercial aircraft in the world, which will go into operation on C.P.A.I. trans-Pacific and trans-Polar routes in 1957. Canadian Pacific Airlines has purchased five giant model 310 Britannias, with an option for an additional five, for delivery next year. Capable of carrying 100 passengers, the new 400-mile-an-hour aircraft are powered by four Bristol Proteus 755 turbo prop engines with the equivalent of 4,150 horsepower each. Fully loaded, the aircraft weighs 170,000 lbs.

**HEALTH DEPT. ORDERS  
SCHOOL EMPLOYEE XRAYS**

Hon. W. J. Dunlop, minister of Education for Ontario, and Hon. Mackinnon Phillips, Minister of Health, have announced that periodic chest x-ray examinations will be required of all employees of school boards throughout the province.  
Elementary school inspectors, superintendents of public schools, directors of education, principals of secondary schools and secretaries of secondary school boards have been named as the officers to report to the Minister of Education. Each school board employee is to have a chest x-ray film taken, when directed to do so by his reporting official, within each four-year period beginning November 1st, 1956. The employee is to obtain from the examining agency an identification card which is to be retained and shown to the reporting official upon request as proof that he has met the requirements of the plan.  
Community chest x-ray surveys operated by the Division of Tuberculosis Prevention of the Ontario Dept. of Health, the Gage Institute of the National Sanatorium Association, and the Niagara District Sanatorium are to be used wherever and whenever possible for the purposes of the program. Certain specific x-ray centres such as hospitals, sanatoria, and chest clinics will be used where community surveys are not available.

**Board Chairman Reviews  
Improvements at Manor**

In his remarks on Sunday when the new staff residence at Halton Centennial Manor, Milton, was opened, Robert Shannon, reeve of Burlington, and chairman of the board of management, gave a resume of improvements which have been made and others which are planned to the buildings and the grounds.  
Mr. Shannon introduced superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Eric Clarke, and the members of the board who include Stan Allen, county warden and Georgetown reeve; Archie Service, reeve of Nassagaweya; William Card, reeve of Oakville; and William Deans, secretary treasurer.

Text of Mr. Shannon's speech was:  
"It has been five years since the people of Halton viewed the facilities they provide for their elder citizens. With an expansion program of \$140,000, this year which brings the investment in facilities to nearly a million dollars, the Board has extended this invitation to the citizens of Halton to acquire a first hand knowledge of the workings of the Home. This expansion has given us 21 more beds for a total of 116 beds. It doubled space for married couples as well as giving spare beds in women's wing.  
There is another purpose in extending this invitation besides an inspection trip. In years past the homes for elderly citizens have often been set off in one part of a town or city and not too much interest taken in the activities of the elderly people on the theory that they were too old to be bothered and wanted to be left alone. Your board of Halton Centennial Manor doesn't believe that such is the case. We want the people that are in this home to be as much of the community as they were when they were living in their own homes. By inviting you people here today we hope we are bringing the life of the community closer to our residents and we hope our residents become an integral part of the community life.  
Most of the residents of the home are in very good health, and have a good full life ahead of them yet, we want them to enjoy it to the fullest measure, and this can only be done by their being a part of community life.  
The Board which you have charged with the responsibility of providing for our older people want to provide everything we can for them. The older people of Halton, of Ontario and of Canada have left us a form of government, a way of life, bountiful opportunity and security which is the envy of the world. Nothing is too good for those that have left us the heritage that we in Canada enjoy today.  
This year we have asked Mrs. Mary Pettit one of the original building committee members and who has always taken a great interest in the home to form a small sub-committee of the Board to enhance the welfare of residents in any way they can. They are not responsible for any financing or operations of the home but for organizing events, tours, outings, etc. Our superintendent and matron have the prime

responsibility for organizing such things, but we thought this committee of Milton residents would be of assistance, and it has.  
We anticipated our needs for the erection of a staff residence some years ago, and we have been setting aside yearly out of our budget amounts which will mean that the building you see over there today has been paid for, there will be no need to issue debentures to complete the financing. This will save ratepayers many tens of thousands in interest charges.  
I would point out to you a few of the things to watch for:  
1 You will note extensive sidewalk patterns which will permit our residents to get exercise for longer periods in the year. 2 On the left is a patio for the men, on it is a checkerboard court as well, chairs will be put on, and this winter large shade trees will be planted around it. 3, on my right is a patio for women which will have large shade trees and seats on it. 4, As you walk along the sidewalks you will note large bolts embedded in cement, that is where our light standards similar to what you see will be erected in about a week. You will note the rows of smaller sized trees; 6 Clumps of large trees will be planted this winter when it is possible to move them; 7 This driveway has been paved and curbed; 8 In the staff residence itself, the superintendent has an apartment at the south end, there is a day room on the first floor for all staff, as well as accommodation for 20; 9, You won't be able to see some work inside which is not quite ready which will provide for more married couples; 10, Rails in the halls were installed in the last few weeks, already some residents who moved around very little before are now getting around the home a great deal more with the use of the rails, and that is what we want them to do, to be up and around; 11 In the basement is a chapel where regular services are held, you are invited to view it.  
12, Right behind me are the administration offices to the right is the women's wing, and that is the men's wing. At the back behind the women's wing is the infirmary wing, the laundry and the special care section. 13, As you enjoy refreshments at the end of your tour in the dining room, you may note our setup for serving the residents a cafeteria style dinner, which we instituted this year, to give them the maximum possible variety in their meals and to avoid everywhere that we can the routine of an institution. 14, The entrance has been improved by erecting a sign, which will be lighted at night. It will have large bronze letters, the sign on it today is just temporary.  
In closing I would like to extend thanks to you for coming today, and for the interest you show in our residents and home, and I would thank on behalf of the board and residents, all the very fine organizations that have so generously donated equipment, or other comforts, or time to entertain our residents.  
We in Halton can be proud indeed for the care and comfort we accord our elderly citizens."  
Warden Allen introduced guest speaker Earl Ludlow, Ontario director of homes for the aged, and F. W. B. Fitzgerald, Milton, officiated at the flag raising.
