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## Remembrance Day and Poppies

Remembrance day and poppies are closely linked, and this week-end Georgetown will again honour its war dead in the customary manner.

On Saturday taggers will be on the streets and calling door to door, asking donations to the Poppy Fund, a national fund for veterans administered locally by a group of civic minded citizens. The poppy campaign has heavy Legion sponsorship, but its good works are not restricted to Legion members. In fact, according to campaign officials, 70 percent of the assistance given is to non-Legionnaires.

The poppy is significant in three ways. It provides aid for disabled veterans and

dependents, or for those in temporary or permanent need.

It provides employment for handicapped veterans in factories where poppies and wreaths are produced in quantity.

And it serves as a symbol of remembrance, as told in John McCrae's famous poem.

There should be no one this week-end who does not proudly wear a poppy to honour Canada's men who sacrificed their lives in two world wars and in Korea. There should be no one who does not attend the solemn service at the cenotaph early Sunday afternoon.

## This Troubled Old World

If you're like us, you almost hate to pick up a daily paper or hear a newscast these days, with headlines screaming of British-French intervention in the Israeli-Egyptian war, the Soviet march into Hungary where patriots tried to throw off a foreign yoke, continuing trouble in Cyprus and possibilities of an uprising in East Germany.

It is a sadly mixed up affair, particularly in Egypt. The British parliament is far from unanimous in its action. The United States, taken by surprise in the midst of an election campaign, has issued a conflicting series of statements and opinions. Canada has kept in the middle of the road, hesitating to either condone or condemn military action while suggesting that a U.N. police force restore order. Russia has suggested that she and the States should intervene on Egypt's behalf.

We like to be optimistic and hope that those in Britain and France who have all the facts at their disposal have done the right thing and

that their action, rather than fomenting a world conflict, may save one from starting.

It is too big a problem for the ordinary man to even have any sensible opinion... and too often the city paper columnists who rush their pronouncements into print are just that — ordinary men whose knowledge is no greater than yours or mine.

To be factually informed, we suggest that one read the straight news reports from the large press associations, such magazines as News Week, Time, Saturday Night, the better English newspapers if you can get them.

From recognized sources one can then perhaps form an opinion. As for the millions of words being ground out by columnists and reporters, the "quotes" from everyone from embassy doormen to Marilyn Monroe... read them by all means, but don't take every word for gospel.

## William Hayes, 77 Lifelong Orangeman

William Henry Hayes, 77, was buried in Glen Williams Cemetery yesterday afternoon, following funeral service conducted at the Harold C. McClure funeral home by Rev. Alfred Barker.

Mr. Hayes died in Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, on Saturday. He had lived at 71 Main St. N., Georgetown for the past year, moving to town from Inglewood.

He was the son of the late Jack and Mary McBride Hayes and spent his youth in Grand Valley, where he attended public school. He joined the 126th Battalion in Brampton in 1915, served in France with the 18th Battalion CEF in the first World War.

After the war, he lived at Terra Cotta where he was employed at the old Halton Brick Co. until 1932. He then moved to Inglewood where he worked with Inglewood Quarries until he retired in 1941.

Mr. Hayes was a lifelong member of the Loyal Orange Association. He first joined in Toronto, later transferring to Cheltenham and then to Dublin LOL 76, Campbell's Cross. Six lodge members acted as pallbearers yesterday, Elmer Campbell, Otto Wiggins, Charles Sanderson, William Fraser, John McCullough, and Melsom Bailey. He was a member of First Baptist Church, Georgetown.

Surviving are his wife Alice Davidson whom he married in New Toronto in 1919; six children, all of whom live in Georgetown, Gear, Main St.; Mary, Mrs. John Emmerson, Victoria Cresce; Margaret, Mrs. John Keir, Chapel St.; Betty, Mrs. Gerald Perkins, Queen St.; William and Bud at home, and 18 grandchildren. A daughter Lola died in 1931. He also leaves brothers and sister, John Hayes of Napanee, Mrs. May Mandar, Port Credit, and Albert Hayes, Mitchell. He was predeceased by a brother Edward Hayes of Toronto and a sister, Mrs. James Watt, Hamilton.

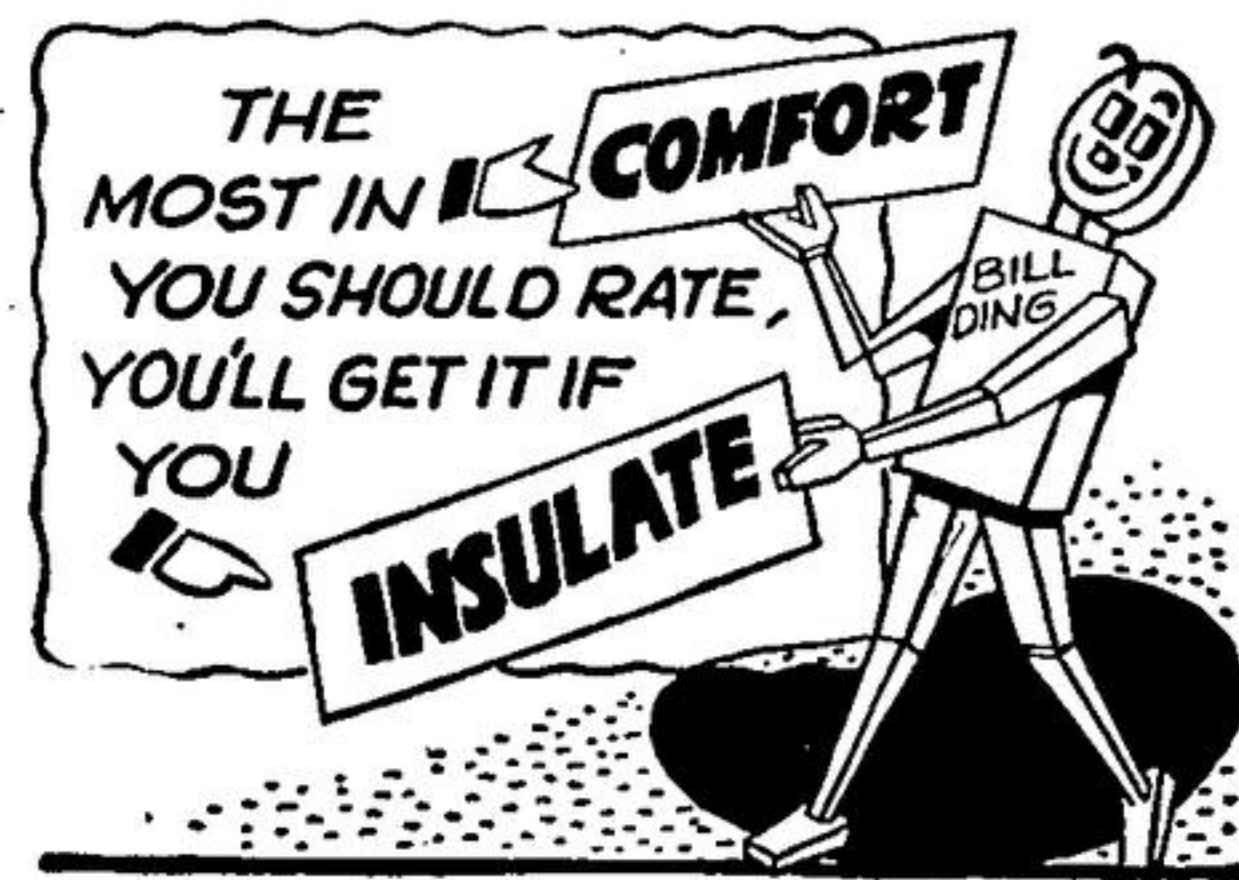
