David Charlesworth, 84, a Charles Street resident . . . Mrs. Robert Fry, 20, the former Sadie Jane Bell, of Glen Williams . . . Boys from the Armenian school presented a concert in the theatre at Brampton . . . Dr. C. V. Williams was appointed medical officer of health for the town . . . Knox Church had a bumper crowd for their fowl supper. Among musicians who entertained were A. B. Castell, Mrs. Arthur Herbert, Jessie Leavitt, Hettie Lawson, and Mrs. W. C. Bessey . . . Lee Ashford and Beatrice Beaumont were married in St. Alban's, Glen Williams . . . Frank Petch and Dora McClellan in Stratford . . . Harold Cleave and Edna McDonald in Simcoe . . .

NOW . . . November, 1956

The Armenian school accomplished its good work and closed after making useful citizens of orphans from that war-ravished country. One, an Oakville businessman, is in Georgetown occasionally. Another gets his name in the papers now and then for his polar bear swims and his feat of pulling cars with his teeth . . . Dr. Williams continued in his MOH position until formation of the county health unit

which now administers health affairs . . . Knox Church has just had another successful anniversary supper, though nowadays the entertainment has been dropped in favour of a straight meal . . . Mr. and Mrs. Ashford are residents of Ancaster, the Petches and Cleaves live in Georgetown . . .

Twenty Years Ago

THEN . . . Herald, Nov. 4, 1936

Reuben Eason and Elsie Carter were married in St. George's Anglican . . . T. A. Leslie and Marion Giffen were married and took up residence near Streetsville . . . The arena board discussed installing an artificial ice plant at an estimated cost of \$15,000 . . . Robert Lynn, 92, a former superintendent of the Barber Paper Mills died at Springfield, Mass . . . Mitchell Cooper, 87, died at Long Branch and was buried in Georgetown . . . A carload of vegetables was shipped to Unity, Sask. for those in need . . . Albert Richard Hulme, 14-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Hulme died . . . St. Alban's A.Y.P.A. presented a play "Bashful Mr. Bobbs" . . . Golfers receiving prizes at the closing of Cedarcrest included Eric Allen, Roaf Barber, Sam Mackenzie, Mrs. I. E. Fleck and Marjorie Gault . . . Jack Duncan was transferred to a Toronto branch of the Bank of Commerce . . . GHS lost their final football game with Milton 10-6, Louth getting Georgetown's touchdown. McCumber was a Georgetown casualty with a broken arm . . . Another exciting football game saw the grads win 5-1 on a touchdown by Bruce Kennedy, described as "the galloping ghost" Graham Farnell and Gord Alcott were mentioned as standouts for the grads. Bob Goldham kicked the only GHS point . . .
