Fire Threatens Isley Home in Glen

A fire in a second storey fireplace was blamed for damage to a downstairs wall and a chest of drawers in a Glen Williams home last Friday, November 9th.

Sparks from the blaze in the fireplace of the upstairs apartment tenanted by Mr. and Mrs. Earvin Evans ignited a bundle of rags stuffed into the chimney of the old farm home years ago.

The burning cloth became unloosed and dropped down the flue into a boarded over fireplace in the ground floor apartment of Mr. and Mrs. William Isley.

The partition broke into flames which spread to a nearby chest of drawers. Mrs. Isley extinguished much of the blaze before calling Georgetown firemen who arrived in time to hold damage down to the one wall and the dresser. Mrs. Isley's quick action probably saved the house from being razed.

The building stands on the Lloyd Davison farm and was previously owned by William Gilman.
