REV. LOCKHART ROYAL HEADS NEW ASSOCIATION

Clergymen of Georgetown and district met at the Presbyterian manse in Norval, November 8th, and organized the Credit Valley ministerial association.

Executive officers elected are — Rev. G. Lockhart Royal, Norval, president; Rev. Alfred Barker, Georgetown, vice president; Rev. W. Edgar Gill, Norval, secretary-treasurer. Other members present were Rev. James E. Maxwell, named convener of the Norval committee; Rev. Kenneth Richardson, of Georgetown; Rev. Eric V. Warren, Huttonville; Rev. Walter Brightman, Cheltenham. Rev. Alex Calder was named convener of the Georgetown committee. Local committees will meet regularly to deal with local matters and will report to the monthly meetings of the association.

Vigorous discussion arose regarding bible teaching in the schools; training of Sunday School teachers on a community basis; how to keep young people in the church; increasing acceptance of the memorial gift principle. The secretary was asked to introduce this subject for full discussion at the next meeting, bringing samples of cards and materials now available. The second meeting of the new association is to be held December 3rd in the Norval United parsonage.

Stated purposes of the ministerial association, as outlined in the organization motion are:

To include the areas of Ballinafad, Cheltenham, Georgetown, Hornby, Huttonville and Norval;

To promote truly Christian fellowship between ourselves and our people;

To strengthen our Christian witness, and increase our service to our common community;

To coordinate our services to the schools and to the community in general;

To plan and execute cooperative activities;

To study how we may better serve our area as brethren in Christ;

To share with each other our plans and dreams, our needs and victories, personal experiences and reading matter that may be of mutual help and inspiration;

To support each other, so as to make our own and our Church's ministry more effective, locally, and in relation to the world-wide work of our Lord Jesus Christ."

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REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY IMPRESSIVE PARADE

The annual Remembrance Day service was held on Sunday last, November 11th. The service was held at 12.30 at the Cenotaph, with the parade assembling at 12.15 in front of the Legion Hall, in order that it would not interfere with the acts of remembrance held in the respective churches that morning at 11.00 until 12.00 a.m.

The opening address was given by mayor John T. Armstrong, who paid tribute to those gallant men who had given their lives to the cause of freedom. He spoke of the great sacrifice made by them to ensure our freedom, and said that they would never be forgotten.

The service opened with a hymn "Jesus, Lover of My Soul", followed by the Lord's Prayer, said in unison, led by Rev. Morgan McFarlane, St. John's United Church. The Holy Scripture was taken from Ecclesiastes 4:1-15, by Mr. McFarlane. Then followed the playing of the wreath by the various representatives of remembrance, as well as Canada and Legion and the Ontario Government. The Honour Roll was read by J. Fred McCartney, and that of the 1939-1945 casualties was read by president Harvey Garvin, of Branch 129.

That beautiful and touching hymn "O Valiant Hearts" was played by the Legion Scouts Band, and joined in by all present.

RADIO FARM FORUM

Farm Forums Suggest School Milk Supplied

The 1956-57 National Farm Radio Forum season opened Monday evening, October 29th with good attendance reported by Halton County groups.

It was most fitting that the first topic under discussion concerned Canada's greatest asset and responsibility — her children — especially at school age. The topic was "School Milk." All groups agreed that a program to supply milk to all school children in Canada should be developed. One group suggested that the welfare worker could probably do more to help under-privileged children than schools.

Very few schools in Halton supply milk to school children but it was suggested that where feasible local dairies might deliver milk to the schools but most felt some means of refrigeration would be necessary. The third question dealt with the financing of such a project. Practically all the groups thought the government might give some financial assistance with parents, school boards, or social groups paying part, one group suggested some of the money obtained through the June set-aside might be used for this purpose; thus advertising milk and improving the health of school children.

The question was asked: "Have you a Farm Forum group meeting in your neighbourhood? If not we urge you to get some of your neighbours together and form one. Farm Forum belongs to the farm people themselves and all farm organizations and educational groups may benefit. All rural organizations are invited to make use of Farm Forum. If any of these are interested in the opinions of those most vitally affected by any project or controversial question they are invited to send questions to the forum groups who will discuss same and pass on their findings. This method is recommended by the Provincial Board.

Farm Radio Forum is simply an implement to be used by farm people but it cannot and will not do anything unless it is used. Members of the county committee are willing to give any help they can at all times.

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
