

Notice to All Electors of the Town of Georgetown Qualified to Vote on Money By-Laws

On Monday, December 10, 1956, at the next ensuing Municipal election you will be asked to vote for or against the following money by-law:

By-Law No. 56-40

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN

A BY-LAW to authorize the borrowing of \$111,000 upon debentures to pay for the cost of alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed.

WHEREAS the Board of Parks Management for the Town of Georgetown has applied to the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown to raise the sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand (\$111,000.00) by borrowing such sum upon debentures for the purpose of making alterations and additions to the Georgetown Memorial Arena in the manner set forth in Schedule "B" hereto annexed;

AND WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown has deemed it advisable to obtain the assent of the electors of the Town of Georgetown to the issue of the necessary debentures for the purpose aforesaid;

AND WHEREAS by By-law No. 56-40 this by-law was submitted to the electors of the Town of Georgetown on the 10th day of December, 1956 for their assent;

AND WHEREAS the vote thereon was in favour of this By-law and the votes against this By-law;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and advisable to grant such application to borrow the said sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) for the purposes aforesaid upon the credit of the Corporation and to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) payable annually, which said sum of One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) is the amount of debt intended to be created hereby;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in annual instalments during the period of fifteen years next after the date of issue of such debentures, with the interest in respect of such amounts respectively that, with the interest in respect of the debt, the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in each year shall be as nearly as possible the same, subject to the statutory proviso that each instalment of principal may be for an even \$100.00, \$500.00 or \$1,000.00, or multiple thereof, and, that notwithstanding anything herein contained, the annual instalments of principal and interest may differ in amount sufficiently to admit thereof;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$8,827,435;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt of the Corporation exclusive of local improvement debts secured by special rates or assessments, is \$756,887.24 and no part of the principal or interest of such debt is in arrears; and the amount of additional debenture debt authorized by this By-law is \$239,625.52;

AND WHEREAS by Order dated the day of 1956, the Ontario Municipal Board has approved the purpose of the said borrowing and the passing of all requisite by-laws, including debenture by-laws;

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown pursuant to Section 386, Sub-Section 53 of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1950, Chapter 243, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS—

For the purpose aforesaid, the Corporation shall borrow upon the credit of the Corporation a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$111,000.00) and shall issue serial debentures thereon in the sums of not less than \$50.00 each. Each debenture shall bear interest at the rate of Five and One-half per centum (5½%) per annum payable annually and shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of such interest.

2. That the debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued at one time and within two years after the day on which this By-law is passed, may bear any date within such two years and shall be made payable in annual

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instalments during the period of fifteen (15) years next after the date of issue thereof, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be the amounts so designated in Schedule "A" hereto annexed.

3. That the debentures shall be payable as to both principal and interest in lawful money of Canada and may be made payable at such place, or places, in Canada as shall be designated thereon.

4. The said debentures shall be sealed with the Seal of the Corporation and signed by the head of the Council, or by some other person authorized by By-law to sign the same, and by the Treasurer. The said interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer and his signature thereon may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. Commencing in the year 1958 and thereafter in each year in which an instalment of principal of the said debt and interest be due, the Corporation shall levy and raise the specific sum shown for the respective year in the fourth column of the said Schedule. Such sum shall be levied and raised by a special rate sufficient therefor, over and above all other rates, upon all the rateable property in the Municipality.

6. The said debentures may contain a clause providing for the registration thereof pursuant to Section No. 335 of the Municipal Act.

7. Pending the sale of the said debentures, the head of the Council and the Treasurer may raise for the purpose aforesaid by way of loan on such debentures any sum, or sums, of money not exceeding in all the sum hereby authorized to be borrowed and may hypothecate such debentures for such loan.

8. The Corporation shall have the right, at its option to redeem the said debentures either in whole or in part on any date prior to maturity at the places where and in the moneys in which the said debentures are expressed to be payable, upon payment of the principal amount thereof together with interest accrued to the date of redemption and upon giving previous notice of said intention to redeem by advertising once in the Ontario Gazette and once in a daily newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Toronto, and once in a local newspaper, such notice to be advertised as aforesaid at least sixty days before the date fixed for redemption. Notice of intention so to redeem shall also be sent by post at least sixty days prior to the date set for such redemption to each person in whose name a debenture so to be redeemed is registered at the address shown in the Debenture Registry Book.

BY-LAW read a First time this 15th day of October, 1956.

3. The foregoing By-law as first published on the 7th day of November, 1956.
4. Any tenant who desires to vote on the foregoing proposed By-law must deliver to the Town Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote the declaration provided for by Sub-section 3 of Section 276 of the Municipal Act.
5. The vote on the foregoing proposed By-law will be taken on the tenth day of December, 1956, at the following places:
Ward 1A: At the residence of Mrs. Maynard, Arletta Street.
Ward 1B: At the Fire Hall, Guelph Street.
Ward 2A: At the residence of Mrs. George Barnes, 47 John Street.
Ward 2B: At the residence of Thomas Greve, 25 Queen Street.
Ward 2C: At the residence of Mrs. Norene Presswood, 20 Murdoch Street.
Ward 3A: At the residence of Gerald Wilcox, 142 Guelph Street.
Ward 3B: At the Municipal Building, Main Street North.
Ward 3C: At the Public Library, Church Street.

6. The 10th day of December, 1956, at the hour of seven of the clock in the afternoon at the office of the Town Hall is appointed as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Town Clerk.

CANON McCOLLUM CHIEF SPEAKER, LEGION DINNER

Last Friday evening was the annual occasion for Branch 120, Canadian Legion, BESL, to hold their annual Remembrance Dinner, in their auditorium at the Legion Hall, Mill Street. There was an attendance of some two hundred and fifty.

The evening opened with the guests inspecting the new television room downstairs, after which the guests proceeded to the dining hall for an excellent turkey dinner, provided by the ladies of the W.A. Grace was sung at the beginning of dinner, followed by the National Anthem. Immediately after the dishes had been cleared away, the toastmaster introduced the head table guests to the assembly, including besides himself and Mrs. Clark, the president, Harvey Garvin, Archdeacon A. C. McCollum, Stanley Hall, MPP and Mrs. Hall, Mayor and Mrs. John T. Armstrong, Halton warden Stanley and Mrs. Allen, Rev. and Mrs. Kenneth Richardson; Mr. and Mrs. Alex Calder; W.A. president Dorothy and Charlie Day.

After the guests were introduced the toastmaster remarked that it was a tragic fact that one who had been a head table guest for the past five years, was not present that night. He referred to the Legion president, Mr. LeRoy Dale, QC, one whom he felt would not be soon forgotten in this community or in Branch 120. He felt it particularly unfortunate in that it was only one year ago, on a happier occasion, when Mr. Dale had been present and presented Branch 120 with the memorial plaque, a most beautiful piece of workmanship, which should also act as a memorial of his respect and love for the branch in the years that lie ahead. Mr. Clark noted that Mr. Dale's funeral was to be held on Saturday, and hoped that a large turnout of members could be counted on by the president.

He wished Branch 120 and the entire Legion God Speed and best wishes in the years that lie ahead.

The toast was responded to by the senior ranking Legion officer present, zone commander Leslie Clark. He thanked the mayor for his continued support and consideration to the Branch. In his years of service with the Legion he had never met a man in public life more devoted in his help and courtesy to the Legion. Mr. McCollum is Archdeacon of York, and is rector of the Anglican church at York Mills.

The Archdeacon in his reply, made humorous mention of the old livery stable, and kept his listeners regaled with a number of humorous anecdotes and stories. His speech was very well received by the gathering, who gave him an ovation at its finish.

The ladies were able to clear up the tables while Jack Armstrong led in a brief sing song, much enjoyed by the gathering. The ladies were thanked for their wonderful dinner by James Yates.

Dancing to the Debonnaires Orchestra concluded the evening.
