Can't See Water Meters: Cr. Sykes

"Water meters are a liability at present" said Cr. Alfred Sykes at council meeting Monday.

Mr. Sykes said that the \$16 cost of a meter plus the cost of reading it, does not balance with the few extra dollars received in extra water sales, and he cannot see the value of meters.

"I hope we aren't going to get into this perennial debate tonight" replied Mayor Armstrong, who has been a strong proponent of meters. The mayor said meters are not

necessarily installed to create revenue, but can be considered water wastage. Statistics show, he said, that where a community has meters, there is a 30 per cent decrease in water con-
